A THOROBRED MATCH

THE UNION OF LORD CREWE AND LADY "PEGGY" PRIMROSE.

Gossip About the Pair of Them—His Lordship the Best Type of an Aristocrat and Her Ladyship a True Daughter of a Grandly Noble House—Characteristic Details.

The engagement of Lord Crewe to Lady Margaret, or, as she is almost universally known, Lady "Peggy" Primrose, is now a fait accompli.

For several years Lord Crewe has been regarded by more than one anxious mother as one of the most desirable parties. He has been a widower for a long time—indeed, his attachment to his dead wife was so entire, was so profound, and his grief at her loss was so terrible, that many of his relatives thought he would never have married again.

Lord Crewe is a man of such pronounced individuality that it is not difficult to describe him. Except that he is dark, and not blonde, he might be spoken of as a man who could never be mistaken for anything but an Englishman wherever he was found.

Lord Crewe was not born with the title, nor, indeed, was he legally heir to it. He is the son of Lord Houghton, who, as Richard Moncton Milnes, was known to the generation of literary men to which Carlyle belonged, and to the epoch of the English literature of the well-bred Englishman.

As son of Lord Houghton, Lord Crewe inherited considerable wealth among the coalfields of Yorkshire. In Yorkshire he has a fine old house, known as Fryston—a house in which Carlyle stopped on the way to speak in Scotland as head rector of a university, the speech which brought the poor old literature at once a letter of burning affection and admiration from his wife, and, a few hours afterwards, the news that she was dead.

It was through a rich and generous uncle that Lord Crewe received his title. This uncle, unmarried and childless, always treated Lord Houghton as his heir.

This Unavoidable Distinction Given to France—Her Consumption of Alcohol.

This unenviable distinction is now given to France, and is sustained by no less authority than The Lancet, ranked as the greatest, most reliable and careful medical paper in the world.

Dr. Bruynon, in The Bulletins' Medical, says: "The quantity of alcohol drunk at Rome is equal to an average per head of the population of 17 liters of pure alcohol. In other centers of the province the consumption is even higher, it amounts, for instance, to 19 liters at Lillebonne.
