GOAL AND LUMBER DUTIES

THE BOARD OF TRADE WANTS ONE REDUCED AND THE OTHER PUT ON—THURSDAY NIGHT'S MEETING.

More than a score of the members of the Board of Trade appeared in response to Secretary Sotheran's call for Thursday night last.

A COMMITTEE composed of the president, vice-president and secretary was appointed to adjust the matter with Mr. Hopkins.

THE LUMBER TOO. It was furthermore set forth in the documents mentioned, that inasmuch as the Americans charge \$2.00 per thousand for our lumber going in the States and send theirs into Canada free, and since there is in Canada a bountiful supply, there ought, therefore, to be an import duty of \$2.00 put on by the Canadian government.

The president—The Lumberman's Association is soon to send a large deputation in connection with this and other matters. It is essential that we be to the interests of Ontario that the duty should be put on.

Jas. Graham—As a member of the council that recommended the memorial I may say that a thorough consideration of the situation has convinced us that the change would be a good thing for Ontario, if not for the other provinces.
