QUEEN VICTORIA'S NEW YACHT

Queen Victoria's new steam yacht being built in the Pembroke government dockyard will cost little short of \$5,000,000. The dimensions are: Length, 380 feet; breadth, 50; depth, 24; displacement, 4,700 tons; indicated horse-power, 11,000; speed, 20 knots. The yacht is being constructed of steel sheathed in four-inch teak and covered with solid brass. All the fittings and decorations will be of the finest and handsomest description. By the Queen's special desire, all the furniture now in use on the yacht Osborne will be transferred to the new Victoria and Albert, as the Queen hates to have new things about her. The yacht will be launched May 8 and christened by the Duchess of York, but will not be completed for another year.

COMMERCIAL.

The Cattle Markets.-On Monday in Montreal best beef cattle sold at \$1.50; good at \$1.50 to \$1.75. Common calves sold at \$2.25 to \$4 each; good brought \$6 to \$10, and one that was in a farmer's stable was held at \$11, while a 10.50 was bid for it. In Buffalo Monday choice stockers sold at \$4.10 to \$4.65; common to good, \$3.50 to \$3.75; calves, \$3.50 to \$4.00; good to choice feeders, \$4.25 to \$4.50; export cattle, \$4.75 to \$5.

The Hog Market.

In Toronto Tuesday choice bacon weights sold in the open market at \$4.37, light at \$4, and stouts at \$3.75. The best hogs in Buffalo on Monday were \$4.10. This was for the very top medium and heavy grade, the general run in this class was \$4 to \$4.05. Yorkers sold at \$3.95 to \$4; pigs, \$3.30 to \$3.35, mostly \$3.30; roughs, \$3.30 to \$3.60; stags, \$2.50 to \$3.

The Horse Market.

-At Grand's, Toronto, on Friday some fairly nice horses were sold at moderate prices. A neat little family driver, 7 or 8 years old, fetched \$61. A pair of raw but fairly good black geldings sold for \$100. A small chunky horse, but a little off in warranty, brought \$42. A lot of common pigs sold about about \$20 and \$25. At Monday's auction 35 horses, mostly general purpose and workers, sold at \$65 to \$89. A very fine pair of mares, weighing 3,100 lbs., sold for \$155. Drivers sold at \$40 to \$75, the highest price being for a nice bay standing 15 hands-a very fair looking and in good condition.
