Editorial Notes.

A SUMMARY of the mineral production of Canada in 1891 has just been published, and shows that the production of the Dominion is steadily increasing. The total mineral output was \$20,000,000 worth, which is \$5,000,000 more than in 1887.

DOMINION-DAY this year will be the twenty-fifth anniversary of Confederation, and the timely suggestion is made that it be celebrated right royally from one end of the Dominion to the other.

WHILST the majority of the reform press have been attributing the sweeping overthrow of their party to the gerrymander, the franchise act, and other such causes, the St. John Sun we imagine has hit the nail on the head, and expressed the real sentiments of the rank and file of the party at least when it says, "The trouble is that the policy of Sir Richard Cartwright has gerrymandered the electors out of his party into the other."

THE Toronto papers announce the formation of a strong company for the establishment of an iron smelting industry in that city. Messrs. Elias Rogers, R. Jaffray, J. K. Kerr, S. H. Janes, John I. Davidson and H. N. Baird are the directors.

THE Irish Home Rule resolution introduced at Ottawa will be looked upon as mere political buncombe by our people generally. The members of the Dominion parliament were elected to manage our own affairs, and not to dabble in British politics.

Irish Home Rule movement opposed the granting to these new provinces the rights to legislate on education and the language question only a few days ago.

THE reform candidate in the recent campaign in East York made a departure from the policy of his party by advocating free trade with Great Britain instead of U. R. reciprocity with the United States, and by characterizing the latter people as "the meanest nation on the face of the earth."

STRONG efforts are being made to stamp out the lottery plague in Quebec. In Montreal especially the authorities have lately been active in this direction, and with much success. The lottery crusade has drawn attention to an evil very much similar in its nature and effects which has been allowed to flourish in Ontario; and against which it is claimed the law as it now stands is helpless.

AN important bill, the work of Mr. Balfour, in the interest of the church of England is now before the British House of Commons. The bill provides that clergymen accused of immorality, drunkenness, etc., may be tried before the Bishop's court under certain carefully defined rules, an appeal being allowed, of course, to the courts of the land.

"We propose to substitute for the present technical, cumbersome and inordinately costly process, one which will be cheap, rapid and just, and we do not doubt that the result of such an improvement in the machinery of the law will enable the church to purge herself of an element—a very small element, I believe—but none the less a deleterious and injurious element which now hinders her work, hampers her efforts and disgraces her character."

The radical element in the House opposed the measure on the ground that it was not desirable to assist the church in its work, as such would tend to avert disestablishment. This unworthy sentiment called forth a powerful rebuke from Mr. Gladstone, who paid an eloquent tribute to the zeal, character and standing of the clergy, and although expressing himself in favor of disestablishment, maintained that it was the duty of the state to remedy any defects in the church as it stands and assist her in her work.

WHEN the investigations into political corruption at Ottawa were in progress last year, the continual outcry of the reform politicians was that the chairmen of the investigating committees were partisans, and that the controlling majorities on the committees were worse than the chairmen. It was claimed throughout the whole proceedings that evidence was unjustly ruled out, and a fair and impartial investigation repeatedly burked.

"judges), in the appointment of which "Caron and his benefitted colleagues "will have a controlling influence, is a "spectacle that must arouse the attention of the most torpid political conscience, and receive public condemnation." It is not necessary to characterize in the language deserved such cowardly insinuations against the character of the judges of our land. The Canadian people have fortunately had reason to feel pride and confidence in their judges, and unfortunately have not been able to form as high an estimate of their politicians. It is said when a lawyer has a weak case, the practice is to abuse the opposing counsel; the case must be a very poor one indeed when it becomes necessary to abuse the bench as well. This is the estimate the public generally put upon unworthy tactics of this nature, and will rejoice that the evidence in the Caron charges is to be taken before a commission of judges, even "though the scandals may be confined to limits much narrower than would have been possible with a parliamentary investigation."

NEWS ITEMS.

It is proposed to construct an electric railway from Hamilton Beach, through Burlington, to Port Nelson.

Peter McKeener, a restaurant keeper of Chicago, through an excessive indulgence in coffee, has become insane.

The City Council of Winnipeg is considering the advisability of adopting Henry George's idea of placing all taxation upon land.

The McMurrich and Cawthorne medals (University of Toronto) have been awarded to Mr. W. A. Parks and Mr. F. J. Smale respectively.

On Thursday evening a man named Harter committed suicide at Milwaukee by hanging because of domestic trouble, and the following day his wife killed herself by taking poison.

The new German Army bill demands an increased vote for military reorganization, and this will be met by a duty on alcohol, and possibly by a tax on newspaper advertisements.

Mr. Gladstone has written a letter to his Midlothian election agents stating that he will be in a position to ask the electors for a vote of confidence at the polls at the end of June.

At a review of the troops at Spandau on Friday, the Emperor gave a sudden order to the mayor to close the schools and let the children attend the review, and within fifteen minutes 5,000 children were on the drill ground.

A new feature in the English electoral field, unfavorable to the Gladstonians, is the appearance of 165 Independent Labour candidates. They are opposed to the Liberals, and will split the vote in many close constituencies, giving the seat to the Conservatives.

Canada's Product Ahead. Canadian cheese brings more in the market than American cheese because Canadian cheese makers make only strictly fine cheese, and then sell it on its merits. When we learn to let that abominable skimmer alone and make full cream cheese, and people realize they can get it, we will have no trouble in obtaining as good prices. Ohio appreciates this, and is trying to enact a law compelling cheese made in that state to be branded "Ohio full-cream," "Ohio state," "Ohio standard" and "Ohio skimmed." The brand shall also give the name of factory and its location. The "state" brand shall indicate cheese made from milk from which only one-fourth of the butter fat has been taken, "standard" shall contain 40 to 75 per cent. of the milk's fat, and "skimmed" less than 40 per cent. The enforcement of such a law would add enormously to the value of Ohio cheese.—Farm and Home.

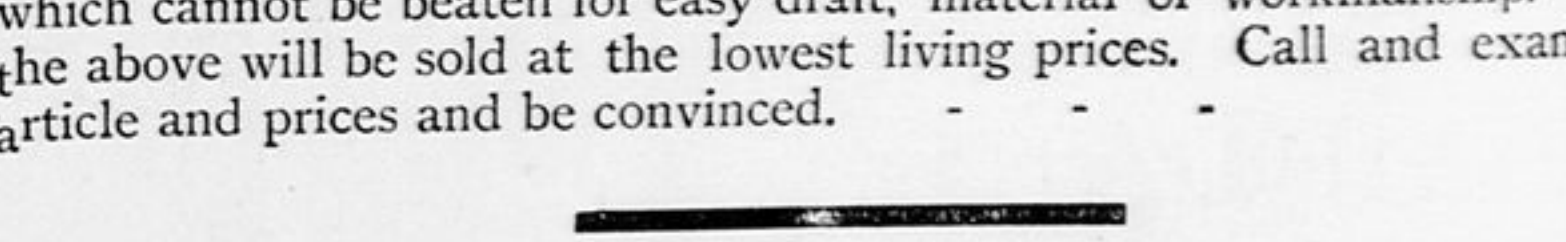
