THE WAR NEWS. A GREAT BATTLE FOUGHT AT MANILLA THE CAPITAL OF THE PHILIPPINE ISLANDS—THE SPANISH FLEET DESTROYED—OTHER INCIDENTS OF THE WAR.

Portugal has announced its neutrality and the Spanish Atlantic squadron was compelled to sail from the Cape Verde Islands.

The expected crash in the East has come, with disastrous results to Spain. Commodore Dewey's squadron completely destroyed the Spanish fleet in Manila harbor early Monday morning.

The Spaniards fought bravely against superior force and suffered heavy losses, including two commanders. Their loss by fire is also very probably great.

The cable is cut not far from Manila and no despatches can be received. Indignation is strong in Madrid against the government.
