Mill Improvement.
 The Saddle, Dundas & Flavelle Milling has nearly completed the extensive improvements which have been going on the past five or six weeks. The magnificent Wheelock Compound engine (h.p.) has been placed in position, and the first time was put in motion on Monday. The work has been under the supervision of Mr. James Buchanan, and that gentleman deserves the most credit for the manner in which he has carried out the task assigned, the difficulties and inconvenience attending the enlarging of premises, and other going on which the extensive business of the company could not leave over. The mill will soon be one of the most complete in the province. To show with the solidity the work has been accomplished, when the engine was running at speed, Mr. Buchanan placed a cent, on its edge, on top of the mill, under where it remained some time taken off, without in the slightest degree being affected by the motion of the machinery.

He was sentenced to six months in the central prison at hard labor.

Obituary.
 On Thursday last Mr. Joseph Williams, head miller in the Victoria mills, died after an illness of about three months. Mr. Williams was born in Ludlow, Shropshire, England, 47 years ago, and came to this country when about eight years old. The New Wharf.
 A little ruffle of excitement was caused on Tuesday morning at the new wharf, when it appeared a misunderstanding occurred between the Crandella and Alice Ethel. It appears that there is a by-law regulating the time a boat should occupy the wharf when otherwise required, and both boats were billed for leaving with excursions about the same time. The Crandella having been tied up so as to occupy the whole space, the captain was requested to drop down a little so as to allow the Alice Ethel take on her passengers, which the captain did not seem willing to do. The authority of Mayor Ray was called into requisition. His worship gave the Crandella a certain time to move, and when that time expired and no sign of moving being apparent, the mayor ordered the lines to be let go and the boat shoved off. The Crandella dropped down stream for few yards when she was tied up. The Alice Ethel came along side and took on her passengers and steamed away after occupying the wharf about half an hour. We do not propose to blame any person for this little breeze, but certainly it is to be regretted that a better understanding should not have been arrived at. The wharf has been placed there for the accommodation of our citizens, and not for any one boat. The council seems determined to support the mayor in carrying the regulations.

Collegiate Institute Notes.

Thursday last, June 2nd, was the twenty second anniversary of the Battle of Ridgeway, when the Fenians under General O'Neal crossed the Niagara river at Fort Erie and were met by the volunteers at Ridgeway. The volunteers were commanded by Col. Booker, who had had no experience in warfare; and owing to wrong orders having been given, they were thrown into confusion and were obliged to retreat. The Fenians also retreated, as they knew that another large force of volunteers and regulars were advancing on them from another quarter. The Fenians did not make any other attempt at invasion, and they soon after disbanded.
