Editorial Notes.

THE first fruits of the short sightedness of the city fathers in not purchasing the waterworks came to the fore on Monday evening last. A request was made for two hydrants in the South-west part of the town and is still a live issue. If it is complied with it will mean an additional expenditure to the town of some fifty dollars per annum, and will at the same time prove a valuable source of revenue to the company from the increased number of water takers. Another point is that if it is the correct thing to comply with the request from this particular section how many more places are similarly situated and likely to be heard from. If hydrants are given where demanded how long will it be before the annual expenditure is increased one, two or even three thousand dollars. It is only right that citizens should be afforded fire protection, but who is to "pay the piper?" Not the waterworks company.

THE LINDSAY CHEESE BOARD

The second regular meeting of the Victoria County Cheese Board was held in the council chamber on Wednesday forenoon, with an increased number of factories represented. Some 874 boxes were boarded. President Robinson opened the proceedings by calling for the number of boxes to be boarded and the names of any new factories represented, with the following result:—

E. Martin, of the Victoria Flour Mills, has put in a new steam boiler this week, one of the largest in town. —Brakesmen R. Marshall and Healey, have been decorated with an extra stripe and are now officiating as conductors on "specials" of their own. —The annual meeting of district lodge, No. 31, Independent Order of Oddfellows, will be held at Bobcaygeon, on Thursday, June 13th, at 1 o'clock p. m. —A joint excursion under the auspices of the Queen's Own Piccolo band, of Lindsay, and the Reaboro brass band, will be held to Indian Village, per steamer, Columbian, on Monday, July 1st. —The large brick house owned by Mr. Chas. Rawlinson, of Kinnmount, was burned to the ground on Monday night. The house was unoccupied and it is supposed that an incendiary was at work. —The annual canoe club races and aquatic sports will be held on Friday and Saturday evenings at the club boat house, foot of Ridout-st. A capital program has been arranged. —On Tuesday of last week the Governor-General successfully laid the corner stone for the new eight story palace being erected for the Independent Order of Foresters. —The Rangeley Lakes is the name of a bright new paper that comes to hand this week from Rangeley, Maine. It is published by Harry P. Dill, formerly American Consul agent at Lindsay, and C. E. Dill. —Noting the present of a silver cup to a brother journalist, a western editor says:—"He needs no cup, he can drink from any vessel that contains liquor, whether the neck of a bottle, the mouth of a pickle-jar, the spile of a keg, or the bung of a barrel."

—The reels begin to hum, now the fishermen have come." Messrs Geo. Mathie and Jas. Appleby visited the trout stream adjacent to Millbrook on Monday last and captured a nice lot of the speckled beauties which were plentiful—was also the misquitos. —The Downeyville picnic takes place this year in Flynn's grove one mile east of Downeyville, on Wednesday, June 12th, Father Bretherton, who has charge, expects to make this year's outing even a greater success than ever. No doubt a large number will go out from Lindsay. —The time for collecting outstanding taxes has again been extended to June 17th. This time it is final as the rolls must be returned on or before that date. We warn the delinquents no longer try the patience of collector Spier, but accept gracefully their final mandate and pay their taxes like little men. —At the last meeting of the town council a grant of \$1500 was made towards the construction of an isolation hospital, and a building committee appointed. The site has not yet been definitely located, but this will soon be done and we can expect the first sod to be turned in the near future. —The work of Waller Bros. on the fine residence recently built for Mr. Jas. Farrelly, of Ops, is a credit to this young firm, and is freely commented upon by those who have inspected the work. They are at present putting a nine foot stone foundation under the large barn owned by Mr. Walter Curtis, of West Ops. —A pleasant excursion will be run to Bobcaygeon, per steamer, Crandella on Wednesday, June 12th, under the auspices of the Fleetwood and Lifford Sabbath schools. Tickets 25c and 15c. A pleasant day's outing is assured, and citizens who wish an enjoyable trip should not fail to attend the same. —A young woman named H.A. Botting, resident at 746 Fulham road, London, England, writes to the Mayor of Ottawa for a husband, as she sees no prospect of getting one in England. She adds: "I am in my thirtieth year, strong, healthy, good tempered, thoroughly domesticated in cooking and housework, and I would do my utmost to make my husband a good and industrious wife. —On Monday last an interesting shooting match took place at the range for a silver tea set, between the local sportsmen, Messrs Hines and Wellington. The old opera house has been granted them in which to hold their sessions, and the town will be honored with their presence for several days. A strong committee of the local brethren have arrangements in hand, and no doubt no pains will be spared to make their visit here pleasant as well as profitable. —The children's aid society will meet in the council chamber on the afternoon of Friday, the 7th June. During the few months that the society has been established great progress has been made and some young children whose future seemed bent towards dangerous paths have been removed from their bad surroundings and steps taken to ensure their turning out useful members of society. Membership in this society is open to all classes and creeds and those sympathizing with its objects are requested to apply to the president, D. Ray or Dr. Herriman, secretary. —A full meeting of the board of directors for the Farmers' Union Mutual Fire Insurance Company was held on Saturday afternoon last in the office of the secretary, Robert Cornell. Considerable business was transacted, and among the principal points touched upon were the adoption of the form of policy to be used, fixing the rates at which the company propose to do business and with were creditably informed are much lower than that of any other company doing business in this county. —A very important meeting was held in the Y. M. C. A. parlour on Wednesday afternoon, (29th inst.) when nearly 50 ladies assembled to hear the address from Mrs. Conway, president of the Canadian Association of the McAll mission, and Mrs. Howitt, president of the Toronto Auxiliary. Mr. Robert Ross, president of the W.F.M.S., of St. Andrew's church occupied the chair. After the opening hymn had been heartily sung, Mrs. Ross read a portion of the scripture and Mrs. Whiteside led in prayer. Mrs. Conway was then called upon to address the meeting, which she did in an able and interesting manner, by giving the history of the McAll mission in France. That very successful work was commenced over twenty-two years ago by Dr. McAll and his wife in the city of Paris. The McAll mission is an effort to make known the gospel to the working men and women.
