Sweet ys. Sour Whey. Professor G. E. Day has been carrying on an experiment in fattening hogs with sweet as against sour whey, the results of which are somewhat surprising. It is commonly thought that sour whey has little or ne feeding value, but the results of this experiment, which was repeated with another lot of hogs, go to show that its feeding value is practically equal t that of sweet whey. In August Professor Day chose nine uniform hogs and separated them into three groups of three each. Group one was given a ration of meal and water, group two meal and sweet whey and group three meal and sour whey They were fed these rations from August 22nd to October 16th-a period of fifty-five days. The meal was moistened with the water, sweet or sour whey as the case ma be; about two pounds of whey was used one pound of meal. 
