The regular monthly meeting of the board of education was held on Tuesday evening. Members present: Chairman McNeillie; Messrs, Stewart, Flavelle, J. Kennedy, McLaughlin, Deacon. Walters, Macmurchy, Pilkie and R. Kennedy.
