"After landing in Glenboro, I remained there a few days visiting my sons and viewing the country, and I was agreeably surprised to see the crops. They far surpassed my anticipation. From there I drove north-west to Brandon, Alexander and Griswold and found there the crops were not a bit behind. Lots of men, having hundreds cf acres of wheat, all expected to yield from 30 to 40 bushels per acre. From there I drove to Plum Creek, Souris City, Wawanesa, and back to Glenboro.
