A deficiency of from 30,000,000 to 50,000,000 Bushels of the United States not in a Position to Supply the Demand. LONDON, Aug. 31.—It now seems to be a fact that the world needs from 70,000,000 to 80,000,000 bushels of wheat more than the harvest of the year will produce.
