Liberal Conservative Convention
It is altogether likely that the Liberal
Conservative Convention for South
Victoria will be called together for October
4th. A caucus of the chiefs of the party
was held on Saturday last, when the above
date was fixed upon. It was also decided
that the number of delegates from each
municipality should be one for every
20. It will be remembered by our readers
that this was the number advised by a
correspondent to the WATCHMAN a few
weeks ago. The selection of a candidate
to fill the place of the late lamented Adam
Hindspeth, it will be generally agreed, is
no easy matter; and it is to be hoped that
the very best selection will be made, and
no scheming on the part of any fussy
wirepullers will be allowed to stand in the
way of so desirable a result. In other
words let the Convention "put its foot
down solid," and insist upon things being
done "decently and in order."

Sad Bereavement.
A very sad occurrence took place last
Monday morning at about five o'clock,
whereby Mr. John Millburn, stonecutter,
of the South Ward, lost his life. Mr.
Millburn had for some time, owing to busi-
ness anxieties, shown signs of mental
derangement, and a careful watch had
been kept on him by his friends. He
however, early Monday morning managed
to escape from the house, and before he
could be overtaken reached the river be-
tween the railway bridge and Hennessey's
landing, and deliberately jumped in. His
fore assistance could be obtained by his
terrified wife he was drowned. The body
was three hours in the water before being
recovered. The family have the deepest
sympathy of the community in their ter-
rible affliction. Mr. Millburn was a steady
and industrious workman and always had
the confidence of his employers. The
funeral on Wednesday was a large one.

the 24th, on the arrival of the Governor
General.

of the grounds and buildings.

rooms will have a light. This will add
much to the popularity of the house.

the exhibition a good stay in the city.

Messrs. Dundas & Flavelle Bros., have
decided to erect a large grain elevator in
the East Ward. A meeting of our citizens
was called some time ago to form a joint
stock company, but they did not take ad-
vantage of the scheme, and the firm are
now going on with the work. The elevator
when completed, will have a capacity of
60,000 bushels, and will be a credit to the
town.

The nomination for a councillor, to take
the place of Mr. John Comestock, resigned
took place on Tuesday last, when the fol-
lowing gentlemen were nominated:—
Messrs Duncan Ray, H. Walters, J. D.
Graham, J. L. Winters and Wm. Wood.

The citizens, decoration committee de-
cided on Tuesday evening to illuminate
the arch on Kent street, on the evening
of the 24th. The proposition to deal in
the same way with the street could not
be entertained, as the funds on hand would
not permit, and a resolution was passed
asking the Council to take this part of the
programme in hand. The sum voted by the
council is not a very large one, and it
is to be hoped the small additional outlay
for street illumination will be cheerfully
granted. This is a very important part of
the decorating ceremonies, and let it by
all means be attended to properly. The
stores and offices on Kent street will no
doubt be handsomely illuminated by the
proprietors as a matter of business enter-
prise as well as loyalty, and we have no
doubt our citizens generally will respond
to the request of the Mayor and Council
