**The Sewerage Question.**

To the Editor of the Watchman.

SIR,—I cannot follow Householder to Chicago. If the sewage of the town emptying into the Scugog through drains already made and paid for, be objectionable, how is it that the same sewage collected into the one sewer now intended to be built, at great cost, will not be objectionable? It is not fair to blame the council in this matter, the Board of Health is alone responsible. I did not speak of boodle or think of it. What's the matter with Householder? But I must say in all candor that the past experiments of the gentlemen who control the Board of Trade as well as the Board of Health are not calculated to inspire much confidence when dealing with matters of public interest. I beg to say that holding up the inducement of labor and wages is not sound policy in this case at least. It is like cutting down the apple tree to have the apples. Our council are doing a wise thing in keeping clear of the present scheme. Putting broken stones on our streets is an excellent plan, it is to be regretted that we have not money enough to do a great deal more of it. There are three or perhaps four natural outlets for the drainage of the town. They are accessible to most of the assessed property. By following these outlets the cost of excavation and pipes would be very much reduced. If it is objected that such drains following the natural water-courses would be a nuisance, it is evident that a main sewer would be a greater nuisance. If the citizens of Lindsay are as wide awake as I believe they are, they will require something more definite, more feasible, more generally useful than the present one-sided scheme. Whilst following the arguments of the other side I am still of the opinion that the Scugog is not a proper place to receive the sewage of Lindsay.

**Vote For the Sewer By-law.**

To the Editor of the Watchman.

SIR,—If the sewer by-law is voted down it will not be because we do not want sewers, or because the proposed system is faulty, but because those who are placed in charge of the public welfare have not done their duty concerning the sewers. In this age it does not require to be proved that in towns like Lindsay sewers are a necessity. Common sense shows this. Our council are continually spending money to improve the roads. How much easier to make good roads if the roads were underdrained. There is not five per cent. of dry cellars in the town. This would not be with the sewerage system proposed. The tile drain accompanying the sewer would carry off surface and subsoil water, and leave the cellars dry. Damp cellars mean damp houses and sick families. The diseases resulting from damp and

wet cellars are a fertile cause of shortened lives and the large outlay of money for doctors' bills. Consumption is one of the commonest diseases increased by a wet soil and a flooded cellar and with a well-drained subsoil the death rate from this cause would diminish. The walls are polluted by soakage after rains and the continuous flow of matter from privies. Let us have sewers in the central part of the town at any rate. Waterclosets will find chief use there, and there where wells are thickest, and people might be allowed to continue their spring water wells, the sewers will be appreciated. It is objected against sewers that the town will be generally taxed for their construction, and that in the east ward for instance it is not likely the sewers will be used and therefore the east ward should not pay any taxes for sewers. There is much bad reasoning in this. The east ward has most of its young men and women working in stores on Kent-st. for 9 or 10 hours a day. These persons need pure drinking water, and need to be placed in the pure surroundings made by sewerage. In early adult life the need of the influences resulting from improved sanitary conditions is greatest and for this the east ward would be honestly bound to pay. Besides, the east ward, for instance, will share in the general improvement of the town, as it must suffer its share of the loss from neglect of this necessary sanitary improvement. There are some people who object to paying anything in the shape of taxes for any cause, however necessary, which they can evade or prevent. These men are not friends of the public, and their views are limited by a narrow horizon. It may be taken as a safe rule that the men who baulk a sanitary measure such as our proposed sewerage scheme are ready to sacrifice public good to their private ends and care less for human life than for a few mills on the dollar of yearly tax. I would not say our council follow this general rule nor would I hint that they actively oppose sewers. But they are neglecting their duty in not putting fairly and thoroughly before the people the merits of the by-law. The Board of Health and Board of Trade have approved the scheme, and it recommends itself to anyone who has studied it. To be sure there may be difficulties in the way and as the work goes on original plans may have to be altered and routes of sewers diverted. But these are details. We should confirm the general principle, and declare that we want sewerage. The history of towns like Lindsay shows too often that sewer by-laws have been time and again voted down, to reappear for voting, and finally in some future calamity, or epidemic, to be rushed through with all the hurry that is undesirable. This plan of sewerage for Lindsay has been a long time on the tapis and so far the town has made some outlay in the connection. Why not vote the bonus now? The money so voted may not be spent for years, but it will be there for use as the sewers are called for, and

when it will be spent working men in town will receive it who will spend it with our merchants.

There have been no serious objections urged against the scheme. My friend, Ratepayer, has urged difficulties that may be explained satisfactorily, the chief ones depending on improper construction of traps and joints. A board of commissioners should be appointed to superintend the outlay of money and work of construction, satisfying the public as to the efficiency of the work, and the absence of possible log-rolling among the councillors.

**By-Law No. 715.**

A BY-LAW to raise the sum of \$25,000 for General Sewerage Purposes and to issue Debentures therefor.

**WHEREAS IT IS DESIRABLE** to raise the sum of \$25,000 for the purpose of paying the town's share for the construction of sewers by the Town of Lindsay in accordance with the report and recommendations of Willis Chipman, Civil Engineer.

And whereas for said purpose it is necessary for the said Corporation of the Town of Lindsay to create a debt to the extent of \$25,000 and to issue debentures therefor in manner hereinafter appearing.

And whereas \$1536.84 is the total amount required to be raised annually for thirty years by special rate for paying the several instalments of principal and interest at four and one-half per cent. per annum accruing due on the said debt under the terms of this By-law.

And whereas the amount of the whole rateable property of the said Town of Lindsay, according to the last revised assessment roll, is \$1896580.

And whereas the amount of the existing debenture debt of the said Town of Lindsay is \$194,900 and there is no part of the principal or interest of the said existing debt in arrear.

Therefore the Municipal Council of the said Corporation of the Town of Lindsay enacts as follows:—

- That for the purposes above recited it shall be lawful for the Mayor of the said Corporation, and he is hereby authorized and required to cause debentures of the said Town to be made, executed and issued to the amount of \$25,000, payable in annual instalments on the First day of December in each year for thirty years, for the following amounts for the following years respectively, that is to say:—1895-\$400, 1896-\$400, 1897-\$400, 1898-\$500, 1899-\$500, 1900-\$500, 1901-\$500, 1902-\$600, 1903-\$600, 1904-\$600, 1905-\$600, 1906-\$700, 1907-\$700, 1908-\$700, 1909-\$800, 1910-\$800, 1911-\$800, 1912-\$900, 1913-\$900, 1914-\$900, 1915-\$1000, 1916-\$1000, 1917-\$1100, 1918-\$1100, 1919-\$1200, 1920-\$1200, 1921-\$1300, 1922-\$1400, 1923-\$1400, 1924-\$1500, making in all a total of \$25,000.
- The said debentures shall bear interest at the rate of four and one-half per cent. per annum payable yearly on the First day of December each year during the currency of the said debentures, and shall have coupons attached for the payment of interest and the debentures and coupons to be made payable at the office of the Town Treasurer.

- That there shall be raised levied in each year for the payment of the said debt and interest and the debentures issued therefor the sum of \$1536.84 during the currency of the said debt and debentures by a special rate sufficient therefor on all the rateable property in the Municipality of the Town of Lindsay.
- The said sum so borrowed shall be paid to the Town Treasurer and paid and applied for the purposes and with the objects above recited.
- This By-law shall come into force and take effect on the First day of December 1894.
- The votes of all the electors of the Town of Lindsay entitled to vote thereon shall be taken on this By-law on Monday the 24th day of September, 1894, from nine o'clock in the forenoon until five o'clock in the afternoon of the same day at the following places, and the following persons shall be the Deputy Returning Officers to take the votes at the respective places:—

- The 19th day of September 1894 at the Town Clerk's Office in the Town of Lindsay at 10 o'clock in the forenoon is hereby fixed as the time and place for the appointment of persons to attend the various polling places and at the final summing up of the votes respectively on behalf of persons interested in and promoting or opposing the passing of this By-law respectively.
- The 25th day of September 1894 at Twelve o'clock noon at the Town Clerk's Office in the Town of Lindsay is hereby fixed as the time when and place where the Clerk of this Council shall sum up the number of votes given for and against this By-law respectively.

TAKE NOTICE that the above is a true copy of a proposed By-law which has been taken into consideration, and which will be finally passed by the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Lindsay

in the event of the assent of the electors being obtained therefor, after coming from the first publication of the "WATCHMAN," the date of which publication was the 30th day of August, 1894, and that at the hour of places therein fixed for taking the vote of the Electors the polls will be kept open until 12 o'clock.
