THOUSANDS INVALIDED.

French Soldiers in Madagascar Nearly All In Hespital.

Paris, Sept. 3.-The Soliel publishes a letter from its correspondent at Mojanga, Madagascar, which says that 2260 French soldiers are in the hospitar there, besides a large number of others who have been sent to the Island of Reunion, or are about to be sent home as invalids.
