New Waterworks Scheme.
A meeting of the town council and com-
mittee of citizens will be held in the
council chamber on Tuesday evening, 8th
inst., to consider a new scheme of water-
works, offered by a Toronto firm, who
offer to purchase the present system, and
no increase of taxation for new scheme.

Fire.
Last Sunday morning at 3 o'clock a fire
occurred in the house of Mr. Wm. Mar-
shall at the south end of Lindsay street.
The building was totally consumed. The
fire was not discovered until it had made
considerable headway, and Mr. Marshall
and family had great difficulty in making
their escape from the burning building.
Everything was consumed. The building
and contents were insured in the Gore
Mutual for \$500.

Libel Suit in Embryo.
Dame Rumor points to a serious libel
suit. This time it is C. D. Barr against
the Mail. The libel complained of occurred
in Saturday's Mail, where that journal
recklessly coupled his name with a pub-
lication in this town, called the *Warder*.
The damages are placed in the neighbor-
hood of \$5,000, which we consider very
moderate, when we take into considera-
tion the injury to Mr. Barr's standing as a
journalist. Nothing less than an abject
apology will save the Mail from dire con-
sequences.

Electric Light Poles.
A gang of men have been busily at work
this week erecting the poles for the
Electric Light Coy., and it is expected
that the work will be completed by the
end of the week. We understand the
company purpose placing a light at Mr.
Gregory's corner at their own expense, as
a specimen light for the public. Not a
bad idea. We trust the council will see
fit to replace the coal oil lamps of Victoria
Avenue and Victoria Ward with Electric
Lights. Give us more light by all means.

Kindergarten Concert.
The Kindergarten Concert last Thurs-
day evening in the Opera House in aid
of the Citizens Band was fairly well at-
tended. The choruses and songs of the
children were much appreciated, whilst
the Fun and Tambourine drills were
greeted with deserved applause. The
entertainment was very enjoyable, and
deserved a much larger audience.

C. E. T. S.
The regular monthly meeting and enter-
tainment of the Church of England Tem-
perance Society, held in St. Paul's school-
room last Monday evening, was well at-
tended, despite the unfavorable state of
the weather. The President Mr. Marsh,
occupied the chair. The musical part of
the programme consisted of a duett by
the Misses Emma and Lucy Dingle, a
song by Miss Kate Dunsford, and one by
Miss Silver all of which were well received.
Miss Mitchell gave a short but excellent
address upon the subject of temperance,
which was much appreciated. After a
good reading by Miss Marty for which
she was loudly applauded, the Rev. Mr.
Farncomb of Bobcaygeon gave a half
hour's practical address upon the subject
of temperance. The society, which has
faithfully continued its monthly meetings
without intermission during the whole
summer, has determined now that the
holiday season is over to put forth every
effort to secure a much larger attendance
during the months to come.

preparing them for instructions on either
piano or organ. One great cause of the

or organ is the need of a thorough rudi-
mentary training.

The Harvest Home services in the Cam-
bridge St. Methodist Church last Sunday
morning and evening were very largely
attended. The Church, decorated with
the products of the field and garden, pre-
sented a very fine appearance. Both ser-
mons were preached by Rev. Dr. Williams,
and were both eloquent and appropriate
efforts. On Monday evening the annual
harvest home social was held in the base-
ment of the Church, with Mr. Ames man-
ager of Ontario Bank in the chair. An
excellent programme was rendered, the
musical part being supplied by Mr. and
Mrs. Church and Mr. Hart, while Miss
Ethel Flavelle and Rev. E. A. Pearson
gave recitations which were well received.
A most enjoyable evening was spent.
