The Campaign Opened.
 The first shot in the South Victoria campaign was fired on Monday night. Sir Richard Cartwright addressed a goodly sized audience in the Opera House, in the interests of Mr. Lownsborough. The hall was comfortably filled, though not by any means crowded, by an audience composed of reformers, conservatives and a considerable sprinkling of the fair sex. The best of order prevailed. The chair was occupied by Wm. Eyres, Esq. On the platform we noticed, Wm. Lownsborough, Esq., the Reform candidate, and Messrs. Geo. Bick, F. C. Taylor, A. L. Minthorne, D. R. Anderson, T. Stewart, D. J. McIntyre, and others.

The speaker occupied one hour and a half in showing the benefits that would follow from unrestricted trade with the United States. Sir Richard failed, however, to tell how he and his party if returned to power purposed bringing this new *modus vivendi* into existence, further than by assuring his audience, in a sort of confidential way, that he knew how it could be done. Just how, however, he did not explain. The speech it must be added was free from the harshness in the treatment of his opponents, which on former occasions characterized Sir Richard's political addresses. Short addresses were delivered by Messrs. Lownsborough, Taylor, Barron and W. Eyres president of the Reform association of the riding.

P. D. Laurent, V. G. on the happy announcement made to-day, that the parish is now free from debt. We further avail ourselves of this occasion to acknowledge the very great services which the Vicar General has rendered to the parish, not only in the very able management of its finances, during the last six and a half years, but on account of his own great personal liberality in generously donating large sums out of his private resources towards the liquidation of the debt, which though large and weighty when he came among us, is now happily a thing of the past."

The Injunction Dissolved.
 Chief Justice Galt on Saturday made an order dissolving the injunction restraining the removal of Victoria University to Toronto. Mr. H. H. Dewar appeared on behalf of the university and Mr. C. J. Holman for the town of Cobourg. His Lordship made the order on it appearing that the senate of the university had passed a resolution that the university be removed to Toronto and federated with Toronto University. Nothing now remains of the big fight but the reference before Mr. J. S. Cartwright to ascertain the amounts which should be refunded to the town of Cobourg and certain subscribers.

Mr. Alexander Campbell, one of the oldest and most highly respected citizens of Keene, met with a probably fatal accident on Saturday evening. He was going downstairs in his residence when he made a misstep and fell to the bottom. He is now suffering from concussion of the brain and no hope is entertained of his recovery. He is about 75 years of age.

A motion was made in the matter of the estate of the late Adam Hudspeth before Mr. Justice Ferguson on Saturday, on behalf of Mr. Mullett, a Lindsay creditor, to give him the conduct of the administration proceedings. It will be remembered that a few weeks ago Mr. Justice Ferguson, at the request of the Toronto General Trusts Company, who were appointed executors of the estate by the will of Mr. Hudspeth, made an order for the administration of the estate by the court, directing the proceedings to be carried on at Lindsay. Mr. Mullett, who had at the time began an action against the estate, asked that the carriage of the proceeding be taken from the trust company and given to him. Mr. N. W. Hoyles, Q.C., appeared for the motion and Mr. S. H. Blake, Q.C., opposed it. Judgment was reserved.
