"He's shot me, I'm murdered," and did not stop until she got up stairs, imagining that she was pursued by her mureerous assailant. Medical aid was at once summoned, and it was found that one bullet had passed tyrough the flesh of the loft arm between the shoulder and the elbow; another had lodged in the left arm near the wrist. shattering one of the bones, and a third, which could not be located, had entered the body near the pit of the stomach. 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
