The hardiness of this breed enables it to thrive even under unfavorable conditions, and to winter in the open air without suffering. If taken to the pen, after pasturing in fields and forests is over, and fed with corn and other grain, it produces a firstrate lard, which is not surpassed in flavor and keeping quality by that made from any other breed.-American
