The C. P. R. Said to be Negotiating for Pupchi se from the G. T. R. Windson, Nov. 10.—It is again stated here that the Canadian Pacific people are negotiating for the purchase of the Great Western division of the Grand Trunk from Komoka to Windsor. A well-known rail-road man said last evening; "I know positively that the Canadian Pacific railway officials have been for a month past trying to buy the Great Western. Two weeks ago there was only a difference of \$450,000, and this is a mere bagatelle when the magnitude of the road is taken into consideration. The Grand Trunk leased the Western with the hope of forever shutting out the Canadian Pacific, and it is a loss to them. Besides, they have another road running into Detroit.
