





A STEER FEEDING TEST

In a test recen ly conclu'ed at the Minnesota Agricultural school in steer feeding some interesting deductions armade, according to Bulletin No. 10, which contained a detailed account of the experiments. Two grade Shorthorn steer calves were secured, as near alike everything they consumed being kept until they were slaughtered at two years old. They were fed just to keep them ed to a finish. 
