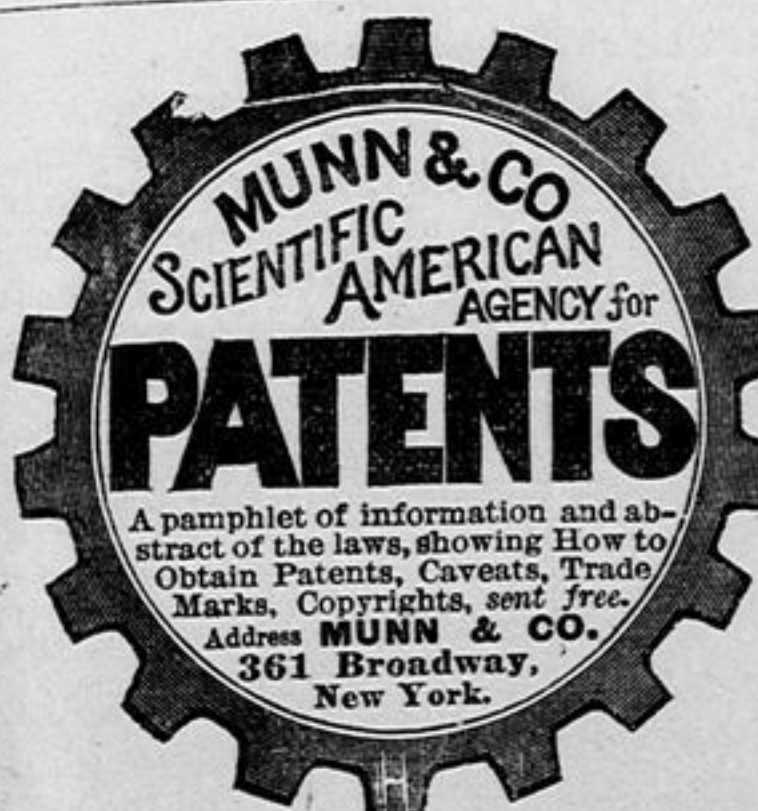

### STARVING RUSSIANS.

COUNT TOLSTOI TAKES ACTIVE MEASURES FOR THEIR RELIEF.

Help from the Czar's Family—The Boodlers Get Their Work in and Steal from the Famishing—People Knouted to Death for the Most Trifling Crimes

Moscow, Dec. 23.—Corruption is so ingrained in all classes of society that the Grand Duke Sergin, a brother of the Czar, is making himself intensely unpopular by his efforts to suppress fraudulent practices. At a recent meeting of wealthy merchants the Grand Duke was roundly hissed. The latest scandal is the misappropriation of \$12,500 sent to the Orla branch of the Red Cross Society, of which the Czarina is chief patroness, for relief purposes among the famine-stricken people.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 23.—The Czar has sent Col. Wendrich to Rostoff, invested with absolute powers to so organize railway traffic as to effect a distribution of corn. The Czarowitz has just donated 50,000 roubles to the famine fund, while the Grand Dukes George, Alexander and Sergius have each contributed 40,000 roubles. Money for relief purposes is also flowing in freely from other sources.

Count Tolstoi, who has just returned from the famine-stricken districts, was interviewed to-day on the present state of affairs among the distressed people. He announced that his co-worker, M. Koyeffsky, recently died of influenza. Count Tolstoi declared that if the Government would promote village industries, sufficient work could be found to avert actual starvation. The ordinary authorities should establish public feeding places, which he said had started 30 such places, which fed 500 persons daily, at the cost of three shillings monthly for each person. The meals consisted of wholesome vegetable porridges without meat. Ignorance as to the situation and amount of stocks of grain, he said, prevents a proper organization of relief. The Government should ascertain the true state of affairs when supplies would be brought from America and other countries. The count indignantly opposed the Government plan of building railways, which, he said, were a curse, and would ruin Russia. Railways would deprive the peasants of the only occupation in winter, when field work being impossible, by acting as carriers they are sufficient to procure food for their horses and keep themselves in condition until field work recommences. The count stated that the wealthy peasant, to be an example, ate mouldy bread and then gave the same to the workmen and their children, thus causing a terrible infant mortality.

### HORSE BOLOGNA.

Sausages and Smoked Beef Made From Horses.

New York, Dec. 23.—Seventy-five barrels of cured horse flesh lay on a wharf at the foot of Maspeth-avenue, fronting on Newton Creek, Maspeth village, yesterday, waiting shipment to a foreign port. They were from Henry Bosse's factory. The factory is in Maspeth-avenue, some distance from the wharf.

A year or so ago it was discovered that he was buying up old horses and converting them into bologna sausages and smoked beef. The exposure brought his business to a stop and he was forgotten.

It now appears he resumed his business some months ago and since then he has been making shipments of horse flesh in barrels. Inspectors from the Bureau of Animal Industry have been on watch at the wharf almost night and day for several weeks waiting for Bosse to make another shipment.

Saturday night Bosse's men began hauling barrels to the dock. The odor emitted left no doubt in the minds of the inspectors as to what the barrels contained. From the Animal Industry was learned Bosse contemplated shipping it away on Sunday. A lighter was to call for the cargo yesterday and transfer it to a tramp steamer bound to Belgium. For some reason the lighter failed to arrive.

During the afternoon Bosse and one of his men went to the wharf and branded the barrels. Some of the barrels they marked "horse beef" and others "horse trimmings." It is thought they got wind that government inspectors were watching the stuff. Last night inspectors W. J. Gordon and James Connors were on guard. They have instructions to arrest any one attempting to ship the stuff away. The meat will be seized under a recent law providing that a veterinary inspector designated by the Bureau of Animal Industry shall inspect all animals and their products intended for inter-State and foreign shipment.

### PRETTY ROMANCE ENDED.

A Tale of Love, Elopement, Abuse and Remarriage.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Dec. 23.—A pretty though tragic romance has just ended by the second marriage of the heroine. Mrs. Piere Pituo, who was a lovely French girl, fell in love with young Pituo and they eloped to America. The husband became a drunkard and abused the young wife after she had inherited a \$20,000 from an aunt. He drove her insane and he is now in the Norristown Asylum. The poor woman just got a divorce here and went to Philadelphia, where she yesterday married a young Frenchman. They returned to this city, where they will reside.

### Called Out the Reserves.

LONDON, Dec. 23.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of The Times says: The Russian reserves have received sealed instructions which are not to be opened until a certain signal is given from headquarters. The greatest activity prevails in all Russian armament works and dock yards.

### Jesse James Outdone.

CHICAGO, Dec. 16.—Jesse James' exploits were outdone last night in Chicago. On one of the leading thoroughfares five daring highwaymen surrounded one at revolver point forced the postal employees to throw out two sacks. The bulky Government vehicle was then sent flying on its journey, the occupants being threatened with instant death if they made outcry or stopped. So complete was the surprise effected by the bandits that the mail drivers failed to utilize the services of a large bulldog which was beside them on their seat. Near midnight the stolen mail bags rifled of their contents were found on Superior-street, three miles away. It is feared that the British steamer Optal which left Shields, Eng., on Nov. 4, in ballast for New York, has foundered.

### INTERESTING ITEMS BY WIRE.

The French Chamber of Deputies yesterday without debate ratified the Brussels anti-slavery convention.

Mr. George W. Hastings, M.P., was arraigned yesterday on a charge of defrauding Malvern College. He pleaded not guilty and was remanded for trial. Bail was refused.

A large portion of the famous South Cliff of Heligoland has been dislodged by the force of recent gales and crumbled away.

The ancient Church of All Saints in Hertford took fire yesterday from a defective flue and was destroyed. It was famous for its memorial.

Advices from South Africa state that a store of gunpowder carried by the Portuguese expedition to Nyassa exploded recently, killing several persons.

A post mortem examination of the remains of Rev. Dr. Stafford show that he died from a tumor on the brain. The remains will be taken to Montreal to-day.

The steamer West Coast ran on the reef near Point Arena, Cal. Ten of the crew took the ship's boat, which capsized and 9 were drowned.

A man representing himself to be Rev. John Weib, a German pastor, has been arrested in New York for stealing Bibles from churches. A large quantity of stolen books were found in his room.

Mrs. Minson was found murdered in her house at Stockton, Conn., yesterday. Her week's old baby was in her arms crying piteously. John Hawley, a negro with whom the woman was intimate, has been arrested.

Consequent upon the rupture of relations between the French Government and the Government of Madagascar, growing out of the question as to who shall grant exequaturs to foreign representatives in Madagascar, the commerce of the latter country is paralyzed.

At Lessines, in the province of Linaut, France, the police commissary Vandevord, when attempting to arrest a notorious poacher named Brichely, was shot and mortally wounded by the latter. A game-keeper returned the fire and killed Brichely outright.

Slope two of Lake Fidler colliery at Shamokin, Pa., is choked with thousands of tons of rock which fell with a mighty crash yesterday. Three miners are buried beneath the rock two miles in the bowels of the earth.

In the New York tug-of-war last night the Danish team beat Canada in 6 minutes, the Norsemen defeated Scotland in 5 1/2 mins., Sweden defeated America in 41 mins., Germany defeated Italy in 51 mins., and the Irishmen defeated England in 1 hour and 5 minutes.

### HANDS OF NOTED WOMEN.

How They Indicate the Traits of Character of Their Owners.

A charming fin de siecle novelty is the photographing of the hands of women. Upon the score of beauty this very new custom has good reason. Poets have spent phrases upon the beauty of the perle hands of their heroines. No novelist of the class given to descriptive detail would omit to mention admiringly the hand of a leading lady of his story in an enumeration of her charms—be it long, translucent as tapering, or chubby, soft and warm.

Since the giving of a woman's hand is always been symbolic of the giving of herself—a symbol that has lived more than or even twice in the history of mankind since it has ever been the privilege of a subject to kiss the hand of his queen, a knight of old to press that of his beloved, his own since, indeed, a fine hand is truly beautiful, whether it contain five or four fingers, and since temperament at least, if not each small particularity character is expressed in it, the hand certainly a sufficiently important feature one's makeup to be preserved in count feif presentment.

The photographing of hands originated a general custom in London about a year ago. Hands had been reproduced in oil by the camera before that time. The hand of the decided brunet, short and plump, and bespeaks an amiable contented, homewifely disposition, of confiding nature, alert and intelligent, but allowably vain and sometimes accountably irritable and despondent turns.

The photographs of hands appear effectively upon black circular or oval faces. A cup, a flower, a piece of brace, anything simple or dainty be the fingers, may enhance the artistic effect.
