#### PRESIDENT BUMPTIOUS.

HARRISON HAS AN ATTACK OF AMUSING SPLEEN-

His Annual Message to Congress-Objec-Bonding Privileges.

has delivered his annual message to Congress. That which is interesting to Canadians is as follows:

International Relations.

"During the past year a suggestion was received through the British Minister that the Canadian Government would like to confer as to the possibility of enlarging upon terms of mutual advantage the Commercial Exchanges of Canada and the United States, and a conference was held at Washington, with Mr. Blaine acting for this Government, and the British Minister at the Capital and three members of the Dominion Cabinet acting as commissioners on the part of Great Britain.

The conference developed the fact that the Canadian Government was only prepared to offer to the United States, in exchange for the concessions asked, the admission of natural products. The statement was frankly made that favored rates could not be given to the United States as against the Mother Country.

This admission, which was foreseen, necessarily terminated the conference upon the question. The benefits of an exchange with the people of Canada.

Some other topics of interest were considered in the conference, and have resulted in the making of a convention for examining the Alaska boundary and the waters of Passamaquoddy Bay, adjacent to Eastport, Me., in the initiation of an arrangement for the probation of fish in the coterminous and neighboring waters of our northern

Retuliation Advocated.

There is no disposition on the part of the people or Government of the United States to interfere in the smallest degree with the political relations with Canada. That question is wholly with her own people. It is time for us, however, to consider whether, if the present state of things and trend of things is to continue, an interchange upon lines of land transportation should not be put upon a different basis, and our entire independence of Canadian canals of the St. Lawrence as an outlet to the sea secured by the construction of an American canal of natural products would be almost wholly around the Falls of Niagara, the opening of ship communication between the great lakes and of our own seaports.

We should withdraw the support which is given to the railroad and steamship lines of Canada by a traffic that properly belongs to us, and no longer furnish the earnings which lighten the otherwise crushing weight of the enormous public subsidies that have been given to them.

Bonding Privileges.

The subject of the power of the Treasury to deal with this matter without further tegislation has been under discussion, but ircumstances have postponed a conclusion. It is probable that a consideration of the propriety of a modification or abrogation of the articles of the treaty of Washington relating to the transit of goods in bond is involved in any complete solution of the question. DR. BRIGGS' TRIAL.

He Is Accused of Denying the Principle That God Cannot Lie.

NEW YORK, Dec. 7 .- In the Briggs trial vesterday Dr. Birch continued his argument. He joined the two charges, 1 and 2, which set forth Dr. Briggs' theory that the church and the reason are sources of divine authority equal with the Bible, and attacked them as contrary to the teachings of the Presbyterian standard that the Bible is the only source of divine authority.

Having attacked the authority of the scriptures there is no escape from the heresy that errors may have existed in the original text of the scriptures, and this forms the basis for a charge of heresy.

He said: "The higher criticism, as represented by the inaugural, uses the same processes as those rebuked by Christ during His early ministry. It makes the Scripture of more effect. Yet the Bible frequently speaks of itself as the Oracles of God. The church is only the trustee and guardian of the Bible.

"If Dr. Briggs alleges that errors exist in the Bible he denies the principle that God cannot lie. Dr. Briggs says that the Bible is inspired of God, therefore he must believe God capable of double dealing and "The autocracy of the scriptures
