Christmas Day at the Cambridge St. Methodist Church.

The morning service was for the children, and was choral, with two seasons of prayer, two scripture lessons, and a short address by the pastor on the 1st Christmas day. At the close of the hour for receiving nominations the clerk declared Mr. D. Walker elected Dep.—Reeve. Mr. McHugh withdrew his name from the list, after making a neat speech in which he characterized Mr. Hopkins as a model reeve in every respect. Mr. Nicholas Brady also withdrew his name by saying he was not a candidate this time, and by stating that there were already a sufficient number of candidates in the field from which to choose.

Narrow Escape.

On Saturday evening last, shortly after the evening express from Port Hope had passed the summit, Daniel Thompson, brakeman, was thrown from the platform of Con. Ryley's train and seriously if not fatally hurt. Thompson was not missed until the arrival of the train at Peterboro, when an engine with a party of searchers was despatched to find the unfortunate young man. It was not until they were approaching the summit, however, that their efforts were rewarded. He was discovered standing up against the embankment pretty badly shaken and very much dazed by his accident. He was at once placed upon the train and taken to Port Hope, where he was placed upon the express and conveyed to his home in Toronto. Much sympathy is expressed for Mr. Thompson, as he is one of the most popular and reliable young men on the line.

Obituary.

It is our melancholy duty to record the death on Friday evening last, of Mr. John Anderson, in his 62 year, from an attack of inflammation of the lungs. Mr. Anderson was the senior member of the well-known firm of Anderson, Nugent & Co., and was one of the pioneer business men of Lindsay. The deceased was born in Lanark county, on May 3rd 1831, and when a youth was apprentice to the cabinet making business with Mr. Hogg of Perth. On completing his time he worked at his trade in Toronto, Hamilton and Osgoode. In 1856 he came to Lindsay, and in the following year was united in marriage to Miss Jane Langton, also of Lanark county, and the same year entered upon his career as a furniture dealer in this town. Many reverses by way of fire and other business fatalities were met by Mr. Anderson in his thirty-five years of active business life, and were overcome by his great energy and enterprise. In all his dealings with the public a strict regard for honesty and uprightness was always maintained, and was characteristic of the man. In politics he was a reformer, but was really too independent to be classed as a straight party man, and frequently voted on the opposite side, as he believed for the best interest of his country. Deceased was a brother of the Rev. K. Anderson, late of the Baptist church, and leaves a widow to mourn the loss of a beloved husband. The bereaved family and friends have the sympathy of the community in their hour of affliction.
