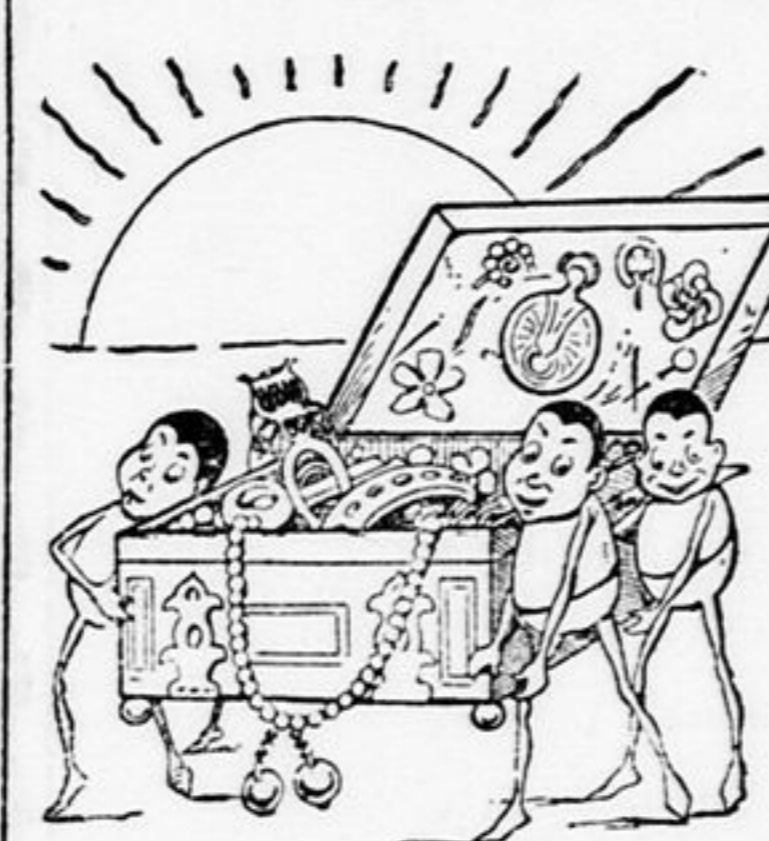

MEET IN ORDER TO WIND UP THE BUSINESS OF THE YEAR.

WEDNESDAY'S PROCEEDINGS.
(Concluded from last week)

The council resumed at 10 o'clock on Wednesday morning. The warden in the chair, and nearly all the members present. Minutes of previous meeting read and on motion were confirmed.

COMMUNICATIONS.
From the secretary of the Victoria County Paving Association, giving a report of the recent financial match and submitting a detailed financial statement. Total receipts \$290 42 disbursement \$244.83, leaving a balance of \$45.59.—finance committee.

FENELON SCHOOL.
On motion of Mr. McQuade, a petition was presented from Fenelon school, and was referred to the education committee.

MOTION OF CONDOLENCE.
Moved by Mr. McQuade, seconded by Mr. Lithgow, that the municipal council of the county of Victoria, now in session assembled, hereby place on record a heartfelt expression of sorrow on the death of our esteemed colleague, E. Bottom, esq., late reeve of the village of Bobcaygeon.

By the death of Mr. Bottom the county of Victoria has been deprived of the services of a useful councillor and the village of Bobcaygeon of an honorable and patriotic citizen. His genial disposition and modest and thorough knowledge of the wants and requirements of the county, entitled him in an eminent degree to the honorable position of warden of Victoria, in which office he has closed his municipal career. While bowing to the decree of prime providence, we hereby tender to the family of the deceased a sincere expression of sympathy in their bereavement. Resolved, that this resolution be engrossed, suitably bound, framed and presented to the family by a committee of this council composed of the warden, Messrs. McQuade and Lithgow.—Carried by a standing vote.

WILL COMPRISE THE COMMITTEE.
Moved by Mr. Switzer, seconded by Mr. Shaver, that the warden and Messrs. McQuade and Lithgow be a committee to present the said motion of condolence to the family of the late Capt. Bottom.—Carried.

CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY.
On motion of Mr. Lithgow, seconded by Mr. Kelly, Mr. J. H. Knight was then heard.

Mr. Knight stated he was present for the purpose of enlisting their sympathy in behalf of the Children's Aid Society. He was not asking a grant, but he would like to have every member of the council become a member of the society. If the society were able to secure by way of a membership a revenue of \$300 they would be able to do a great deal of good. He explained the way in which the society was formed and outlined the objects which they desired to attain. He cited several cases that had come under his special notice during the past year. One great difficulty was in finding homes for these unfortunate children where they could be brought up properly and given a chance to become good respectable citizens, and he solicited the co-operation of the council where they knew of persons who would accept the guardianship of the children. Another difficulty that was found by the society was in securing of persons who would come forward and give the necessary information where the parents of children were bad, so that they could take the necessary steps to remove them to more suitable homes. Homes were provided for the English wifes and he thought that our people should be more ready to provide suitable homes for the unfortunate children of Canada. When the association is properly organized it is hoped that they will be able to have a proper system of inspection.
