Sheridan Bros., Oakwood.

A meeting of the creditors of this firm, who have been doing business at Oakwood for the past ten months, but who were forced to assign a few weeks ago, was held in Toronto the other day. The liabilities were shown to be \$11,000, with \$8,000 assets. The stock was put up at auction and sold to Hogg Bros. at 75c. on the dollar. This, it is estimated, will net the creditors about 50c. on the dollar.

The Early Closing B. law.

A by-law has been passed by the town council enacting that all dry goods, clothing, millinery, fancy goods, boots and shoes, groceries, stationery, jewellery, hardware, stores and butcher shops in Lindsay shall be closed on all evenings except Saturday at 7 o'clock; and on Saturday all stores above mentioned shall close at 10 p.m. sharp. This by-law comes into force on the 29th day of December inst., and will remain in force until repealed. The penalty for a breach of the by-law is \$10. Householders who expect goods delivered on Saturday evenings should order as early as possible, and thus give the delivery men a chance to get home at an early hour as well as the clerks. It would not be fair to ask merchants to deliver goods ordered a few minutes before closing hour.

The Christmas market this year was divided between Saturday and Tuesday, and the two combined made an average market. Well-fatted and carefully dressed fowl were plentiful; turkeys sold at 9c. The supply on Tuesday was hardly equal to the demand. Wheat has taken a drop and is now quoted at 63c for fall, 60c for spring and 50c for goose. Barley, oats, peas and other grains are unchanged. Clover seed remains firm at \$3.60 to \$4.25 for alsike, \$3.50 to \$4.00 for red clover and \$1.50 to \$2 for timothy.
