|To the Editor of the Watchman. SIR,-Permit me to call attention to two or three points in your report of my remarks to the finance committee of the county council when the House of Refuge question was under discussion, which are not made as clear as I tried to state them. You report me as saying "It has been found that local expense for charity has been almost entirely done away (with) by these institutions," which is the fact, as stated by gentlemen of experience at the charities convention. But the succeeding sentence makes me say that local municipalities are forbidden by statute to give more than temporary assistance. There is no statutory provision to that effect in Outario. The point I was seeking to give the committee was that not only does experience prove the statement to be correct, but the result is made effective in the state of Massachusetts, where all local relief, except for a limited time, is prohibited by law. The conference had the benefit of the views of gentlemen from the United States, and the like experience in this regard during the greatly longer period in which this method of caring for the destitute has been on trial in some of the northern States of the Union gave special interest to the features under review. In the case of the York House of Refuge the figures are \$1.05 per week per inmate for maintenance, and \$1.37 per week is the cost for maintenance and interest at 5 per cent. per annum on the capital expenditure; not \$1.37 for interest and sinking fund in addition to the cost of maintenance. The salary of the insp-ctor of the York institution is \$150 per annum, not \$50.—Yours, etc., J. R. McNEILLIE.
