As this was a test suit, it virtually decides the question as to the liability of the township for the money so collected.—Gleaner.

Vennor writes to say the probabilities are that the next marked severe term is likely to occur between the 10th and 15th days of January, or very close upon these dates. This will be severe and probably equal, if not exceed, the December cold term. The third "dip" which he thinks will be the severest of the three, is likely to come upon us in proximity to the 8th day of February, and continue for three or more days. Two other "dips" of minor importance will probably be located towards the end of February, and close to the 17th of March respectively. Between these very cold periods there are likely to occur two or more very general thaws, probably with rains.

The Toronto and Nipissing Railway Co. have for some time past been using Haggis' "Water-Lifter," a device by which the engine-driver can fill the boiler at any stream by the wayside and do away with water tanks, force pumps and extra hands at the watering stations thereby affecting a saving in the running expenses of the road of several thousand dollars annually. The same company have recently put on Stock's steam brakes, which will doubtless render the danger of fatal accidents to brakemen a misnomer and enable the engineer to apply the brake to every car on the train. By it the driver can, in case the connecting link should break and divide the train on a heavy grade, hold every car until the link is replaced. A train running at the rate of twenty miles an hour can be stopped still within twelve rods of the place of application.
