Painful Accident.—On Saturday last, a young lad working on the farm of Mr. Christopher Aliwell, 14th con., Mariposa, in climbing a strawstack with a pitchfork in his hand slipped and fell, the prongs of the fork entering his side. Medical aid was at once summoned and an investigation showed that the wounds although very painful were not dangerous. Hopes are entertained of his speedy recovery.

The Magistrates of this neighborhood have been kept pretty busy during the past week. On Thursday they committed Mr. H. Waller, blacksmith, Hartley, to await his trial at Lindsay, for concealment of property under chattel mortgage, and on Monday, Mr. John Birmingham was committed for trial on a charge of stealing lumber from Mr. Ashman's mill. The evidence in the latter case was much the same as that taken before the magistrates at Kirkfield and published in THE ADVOCATE last week. Bail was accepted.

The Arrival of Major-General Lumsden from India.—Major-General Sir Peter Lumsden (son of the late Colonel Thos. Lumsden of Belhelvie Lodge, Aberdeenshire, and a brother of Sir Harry Burnett Lumsden, a distinguished Indian officer, lately Adjutant-General of the Indian Army, after five years' service, has just arrived in this country. Before Sir Peter left India, the Commander-in-Chief of the army in India (Sir Frederick Paul Haines) issued a general order of a very flattering character anent his retirement from his high office, in the course of which he says:—"It would be impossible, within the limits of a general order, to record in an adequate manner the eminently valuable services rendered by Sir Peter Lumsden, during the period of 27 years, in the course of which he has filled many highly responsible posts on the Staff of the Army; has proved himself throughout an accomplished soldier, and an able, self-reliant public servant; and has won for himself, by his discretion and judgment, the well-merited confidence of his superiors."—Aberdeen, Scotland, Herald and Weekly Free Press.
