Minutes of last meeting read and approved. Moved by Mr. Bowes, seconded by Mr. Parkinson, that Mr. Geo. Douglass be appointed Auditor to audit the accounts of this municipality for the year 1881, Mr. John Kelly being appointed by the Reeve, at a salary of \$6.00 each. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bowes, seconded by Mr. Parkinson, that this council appoint Mr. Henry Yerex Assessor, at a salary of \$100. Lost.

Moved by Mr. Lownsbrough, seconded by Mr. Bowes, that this council appoint Mr. Duncan Carmichael Assessor for the year 1881, at a salary of \$100 Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bowes, seconded by Mr. Parkinson, that By-law No. 266, being a by-law to appoint certain officers for the year 1881 be received and read a first time. Carried.

By-law No. 266 after passing through committee was read a third time and finally passed.

Moved by Mr. Parkinson, seconded by Mr. Bowes, that the Reeve give his order on the Treasurer in favor of Robt. Western for the sum of \$4.00 for repairing road between concessions 3 and 4, opposite lot 13. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bowes, seconded by Mr. Parkinson, that the Reeve give his order on the Treasurer in favor of R. Campbell, for the sum of \$22 per order of Police Commissioners, Woodville Carried.

A petition was presented by Richard Burke and signed by R. Burk and 13 others praying to have the original road opened Con. B, across lot 53.

Moved by Mr. Broad, seconded by Mr. Lownsbrough, that the Clerk be instructed to notify the owner of lot 23, in Con. B, to remove his fence off the road on the south of lot 23 forthwith.

Moved by Mr. Broad, seconded by Mr. Lownsbrough, that the Reeve give his order on the Treasurer in favor of the following indigent persons: Blaws' family, in care of A. Cameron, \$5.00; John Edwards, \$2.00; Mr. and Mrs. McDonald, Lot 1 Con. 9, in care of E. Bowes, \$5.00; Mrs. Sweetland, \$2.00; Widow Wallace and son, in care of L. Paterson, \$4.00. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Lownsbrough, seconded by Mr. Broad, that the Reeve give his order on the Treasurer for the following sums:—J. Giles, for 60 loads of gravel, \$3.00; Widow Johnson, for wood, in care of E. Bowes, \$5.00; R. P. Butler, account for postage for 1880, \$21.69; Hart & Rawlinson, for stationary, \$3.90; C. D. Barr, for printing, \$4.50; J. F. Cunnings, fees for registering births, marriages and deaths for 1880, 25.70 Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bowes, seconded by Mr. Lownsbrough, that this council do now adjourn to meet on the third Monday in February. Carried.—Jno. F. CUNNING, Clerk.

COBURG Public School Trustees contemplate opening a night school for those whose occupation prevents them attending school in day time.

LAKE Couchiching ice is of poor quality this year owing to the heavy covering of snow. The people of Orillia are drawing their supply from Lake Simcoe.

MR. T. H. Walsh has been re-appointed clerk of the township of Brock, at a salary of \$350 per annum. Eldon pay its clerk the paltry sum of \$160 per annum.

THE Port Perry Council memorialized the Legislature to amend the Municipal act so as to provide that at the nomination of candidates at elections the Returning Officer shall not receive the name of a candidate who is not present, unless he shall have signified in writing to the Returning Officer his willingness to be a candidate, and also against the special grants to Collegiate Institutes.

MR. N. G. REYNOLDS, Sheriff of the County of Ontario, died at his residence at Whitby on Sunday week. He had been suffering for some time from the effects of a paralytic stroke received a couple of years ago. On Thursday he was again stricken down, and had been unconscious for the greater part of the time to his death. Sheriff Reynolds went to Whitby in 1854, having received his appointment on the setting off of the County, and held the office up to the time of his decease.

DURING the week many conjectures have been indulged in regarding the safety of the fall wheat crop, of which there has been a large area sown in this section. The extremes of weather which we have experienced would no doubt lead many to fear for its safety from being winter killed. An old and experienced farmer, however, says positively that so far it is all right, and that unless in very exposed sites a such injury is rarely known to occur during winter. In the early spring, when warm days and sharp frosty nights are prevalent, is generally the time when the injury happens.—Uxbridge Guardian.

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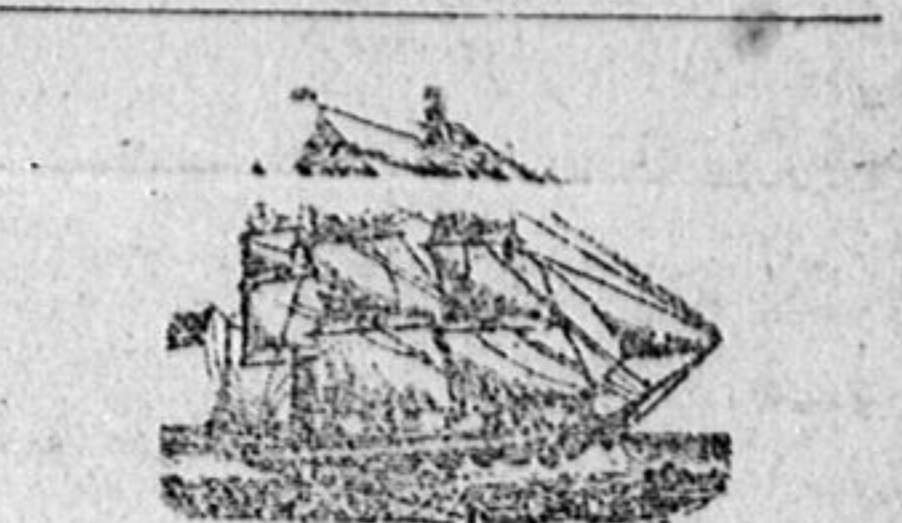
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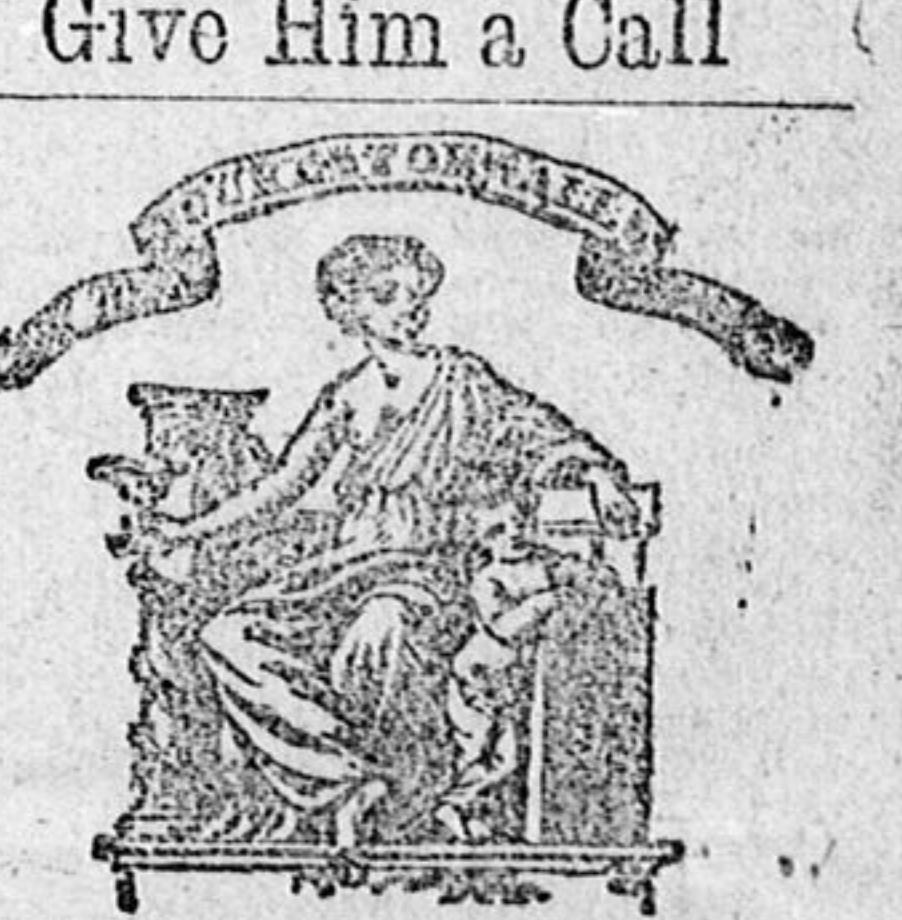

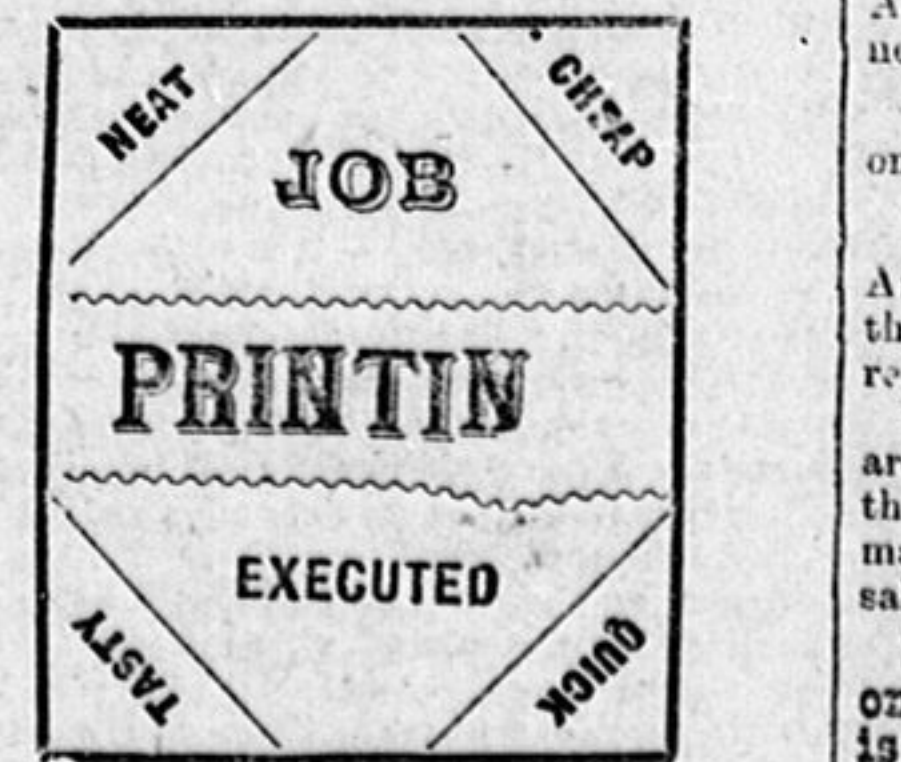
