The Annual Meeting of the N. O. E. D. Agricultural Society was held in the Ontario Hall, Uxbridge, on Wednesday, 17th Inst. The weather was about as unfavorable as it could be, and it told upon the meeting there being but few present.

Mr. Miller was called to the chair and business was proceeded with. The Secretary read the minutes of the annual meeting of 1882. The Secretary read his annual report. On motion the report was adopted. The Treasurer now read his report. The Auditor's report was now read as follows:—

The staff for the present year is T. H. Glendinning, President; L. Burnett, 1st Vice-President; S. Netherton, 2nd Vice-President. Directors and Auditors the same as last year. The Show for the present year will be held on the Agricultural Grounds, Uxbridge, on the first Tuesday and Wednesday in October.

Gould, Esq., be appointed Auditor to audit the accounts of 1882. The Reeve appointed W. A. Silverwood, Esq. Resolved, that By-law No. 172 being a By-law to appoint Auditors to audit the accounts of the Township of Bexley for the year 1882, be now received and read a first time.—By-law read and passed. Resolved, that Mr. Heaslip be hereby appointed to sell the road allowance between lots 20 and 21, N.W.B., to Mrs. Corson as soon as W. H. Corson, Esq., furnishes the township with a deed of the Junction Road in the Township of Bexley, from the lake shore to the railroad, compensation to be the same as paid for Junction road. Resolved, that the Reeve give his order on the Treasurer in favor of A. Hume for \$2.35, overcharge in assessment on Lots 8 and 9, G. R. R., for the year 1882. Resolved, that an abatement of \$11.30 be made in Peter Grozelle's taxes for 1882 as the same property is assessed to another party. Resolved, that a charity grant of \$3.20 be given to the family of the late Colin McDonald to be expended by the Reeve. Resolved, that J. R. Graham, Esq., be appointed Assessor to assess the Township of Bexley for 1883. By-law No. 173, appointing an Assessor to assess the township of Bexley for the year 1883, was passed in usual manner. Council adjourned to meet at Cobocook on 1st day of February next.

It is our painful duty to record the death of Alfred C. Meades, one of Orillia's best young men, which occurred last evening within a few minutes of six o'clock, at Tait's saw-mill, where he had been working. It appears that after quitting work he ascended a small ladder or stairway to a platform near the shafting, for what purpose no reason could be given, and when turning to come down again his overcoat caught in the shafting between two pulleys, and before assistance could be rendered he was so fearfully mangled as to be unrecognizable, one of his legs and arms being almost torn from his body and some fearful wounds in the head and face, that when extricated life was extinct. His clothes were entirely stripped off except a skin-tight garter, and presented a most sickening sight. Deceased was about 23 years of age, and leave a young wife to whom he was united in marriage last summer, who has the heartfelt sympathies of the whole community in this her- terible bereavement. He was one of the most active workers in the Primitive Church, being a local preacher of more than ordi- nary ability.—Orillia Times.

1883 has opened with a terrible record of suffering, disaster and death. The first Sunday in the new year saw the steamship City of Brussels go down in the Irish Channel with a loss of ten lives. Then followed the Newhall House holocaust at Milwaukee, by which nearly a hundred persons lost their lives. Then a circus in Poland was burned, consuming more than three hundred men, women and children, while the Planters' hotel at St. Louis was scorched and several lives lost. The death roll has also been enriched by many eminent names, while storms and floods have made this month so long remembered with sorrow.
