Mara Township Council.

Council met at the town hall, Dec, 28th, 1883. Members all present, the Reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. Mr. Boulton, seconded by Mr. Thompson, moved that the grant of \$30 made at a former meeting of this council, be expended next summer on con. 11, be increased to \$40, and that the same be expended at once under the supervision of John Givins, in gravelling where most needed in that vicinity.—Carried. Mr. Boulton, seconded by Mr. Thompson, moved that Mrs. Snodden's dog tax be cancelled, as she sent the dog away.—Carried. Mr. O'Leary, seconded by Mr. Bruce, moved that Michael Doolan's tax be accepted less the statute labor, he agreeing to perform the statute labor in 1884, and that the Reeve grant a certificate to the collector for the same.—Carried. Mr. Thompson, seconded by Mr. O'Leary, moved that after this municipality had the side line between lots 15 and 16, con. 10, run by W. E. Yarnold, P. L. S., that certain parties were dissatisfied with the line as established by said Yarnold, and a proposition was made by Mr. M. Freil to have the said line run by another surveyor, and if he could not prove the line defined by Mr. Yarnold to be wrong he would pay all expense in connection therewith; and it is the opinion of this council, from the evidence laid before them, that the line defined by W. E. Yarnold is the correct one, and do hereby adopt said line as the proper roadway between lots 15 and 16, con. 10.—Carried. A number of accounts were presented and ordered to be paid. The council adjourned sine die.
