Nothing has given us greater pleasure than to see the firm and solid stand taken by the "Mail" newspaper on the above question and if we mistake not our feelings will be largely shared by the great majority of people. The "Mail" boldly proclaims that it has for ever severed its connection with political parties and will hereafter pursue an independent and uninfluenced policy, that its platform will be the general good of our country and not the interests of a party. We hope its conversion is genuine, as we have every confidence it is. We would remark that independent journalism has been too long in the shade in Canada for the country's good. Whatever may be its object its active support of independent journalism wil have an immense influence on the newspapers of Canada and through them the general public; a broader view of national responsibilities will be engendered and an intelligent toleration of the opinions and feelings of those who have the same great end in sight, namely the advancement and welltare of our common country, will be brought forward. 1st Session of 1887. The village council met on Monday evening last for the first time in 1887. the members being all present. After the usual routine the business of appointing the necessary corporation officers came forward when the council appointed Mr. D. McNabb and the Reeve Mr. D. A. Campbell, to audit the village accounts. The Board of Health next came up for consideration and the action of the Board of 1886 was commented on; nothing could be said, however, the Board having done but little. The Council then appointed the Board for 1887 as follows viz : J. J. Cave, Colin Campbell and W. S. Glassford, who with the Reeve and Clerk constitute the institution for the present year. Considerable discussion followed as to the appointment of other statutory officials, Mr. Proctor desiring to have several offices embodied in one individual and which, he believed would effect a considerable saving in salaries paid. Whether the latter end would be secured or not we are of the opinion it would prove better than the present system. Finally it was moved by Mr. Proctor and seconded by Mr. Young, that the name of Mr. Wm. Daly be inserted in the by-law as Sanitary Inspectory and Road Commissioner, leaving the other offices in aboyance. The report of the Board of Health for 1886, next came in for consideration so jar as it dealt with the Inspector's salary. The Board, it appears, recommended that the sum of \$40 be paid him for his services and some \$2.35 for disbursments Mr. Proctor objected to the amount and after considerable discussion a resolution was tabled by Mr. Proctor, seconded by Mr. Westcott that \$20 be the amount paid for the Inspector's services during the past year, and that his bill for disbursments, \$2.35 be also allowed. The motion carried. In this connection the diptheria cases in town came up for consideration and the Reeve explained that the authorities of Cannington felt somewhat sore over the strictures applied to them by this village in the matter, after which the accounts of the Medical Health Officer and the Chairman of the Board were received and ordered to be paid. The Clork then read the report of vital statistics for the year, showing Births 19, Marriages 8, Deaths 9, an increase of population of 10 on this count; This report not admitting of discussion was peacefully adopted. Mr. Young considered the time had arrived when the council should look to the protection of the village against fire and asked that a committee of the council be appointed to enquire as to the cost of a system of water works and the best means to secure the same. He moved that Messra. Benj. Madill, A. Dobson and the mover enquiries and report. Mr. Proceer asked if the committee would pay all expenses of the enquiry and would like to be assured that the corporation would not be taxed for the same. Mr. Young stated that he did not think the committee should be expected to pay such expenses but he thought but little trouble would be found in raising the amount necessary privately among the ratepayers.
