Railway Changes and Extensions

The C. P. R. to Build Through Uxbridge, Brock, Thorah, and Mara.

The Hamilton Spectator of Friday says: This morning a meeting of the Joint Executive Board of the Northern and North-western Railway was held in this city, at which the following gentlemen were present: John Stewart, John Proctor, Senator Turner, Wm. Hendrie, of Hamilton, and Hon. C. J. Campbell, of Toronto. Samuel Barker, general manager of the road, presided. The committee sat from 10 o'clock until noon.

Mr. Barker was seen at his office after the meeting. "There was nothing done beyond the regular business of the board" he said. "The only special matter was the consideration of some special legislation for our company respecting the issue of securities for general purposes of the road, and the taking up of some of the matters about which I went to England. Nothing was done about the rumored transfer, and the matter was not discussed."

"As a result of the meeting, are you now in a position to deny that there is any prospect of a transfer taking place?"

"I never deny anything the newspapers say," smiled the non-committal general manager.

The financial arrangements referred to by Mr. Barker have in view the raising of money to complete the equipment of the road with steel rails, and the replacing of several important wooden bridges with iron structures, in pursuance of a recommendation contained in the annual report of the Joint Executive Committee.

John Stewart, president of the Hamilton & Northwestern, was the only gentleman who threw any light on the subject. He said: "It was just a regular meeting of the executive for the transaction of routine business. There was no discussion regarding the rumored transfer of the roads, but Mr. Barker informed the board that a proposal would probably, I may say in all likelihood, be made to both companies very soon by the Grand Trunk. I do not know the nature of the proposal or when it will be made. Nothing further than that the announcement was made by Mr. Barker."

There is no doubt the transfer is about to be made. John Bell, solicitor of the Grand Trunk has already revised the necessary documents and it is understood that the Grand Trunk is ready to take over the Northern road.

The C. P. R. people seem quite serene over the matter. They say the road is not worth to them anything like the sum about to be given for it by the Grand Trunk. They have a scheme of their own to reach the northern country that involves less money, namely, to build a line from, say, Claremont, a station on the C. P. R., thirty-four miles east of Toronto, running due north and to the east of Lake Simcoe, and striking the Northern Railway at the point where the C. P. R. has running privileges over it equal with the Grand Trunk or the Northern for that matter. This would involve the construction of 100 miles of road, through a good country, at a cost of \$10,000 a mile.

This new line of the C. P. R. would be shorter than the Northern and run through the townships of Uxbridge, Brock, Thorah, Mara and Rama in Ontario.

The C. P. R. will also build their new line from Toronto to the Niagara river as soon as the Northern and North-western becomes a hostile road. The eighty miles involved will be rushed through this coming summer. The new line will go over Burlington Beach.

HAMILTON, Jan. 6.—The full board of the Northern and of the Hamilton and North-western Railways met here to-day to receive General Manager Barker's report of his negotiations with Mr. Hickson at Montreal. They were not long in conclusion, so that it may be assumed that all went merry as a wedding bell,

and that the transfer of the roads to the Grand Trunk is an accomplished fact. Possession of the Northern's yards and premises at Toronto will be of immense value to Mr. Hickson's road, but the squatter's title under which the Northern has held for many years may be upset, in which case the more valuable it is the more it will cost to retain. It is understood that all the leading offices of the Northern will be looked after,—Barrie "Gazette."

Annual Meeting.

The annual meeting of the Eldon Branch Agricultural Society was held at Woodville on January 12th, 1888. In the absence of the President Dr. J. McKay was moved to the chair. The Secretary read the annual report showing the amount of cash and special prizes paid was \$245.79, leaving a balance on hand of 187.58. Moved by P. McSweyn, seconded by H. Ray, that the annual report be received. Carried. Moved by Mr. McSweyn, seconded by Mr. Stuart, that the report be adopted. Carried. Moved by Mr. Cameron that D. C. Ross be President. Carried. Moved by Mr. Cameron seconded by C. G. Campbell, that H. Edwards be Vice-President. Carried. On motion by Jas. Stuart, seconded by P. McSweyn, the following Directors were elected: Thos. Rear, W. D. McCrimmon, C. Fairman, D. C. Gilchrist, J. Vanstone, A. E. Stabcock, C. G. Campbell, A. Howkins, A. McKinnon. Carried. Moved by P. McSweyn, seconded by J. Stuart that Wm. Smith and H. Cameron be re-appointed Auditors. Carried.

DIRECTORS' MEETING.

At the close of the annual meeting a Directors' meeting was held, the President in the chair. On motion by Mr. Campbell, seconded by Mr. McKinnon, Mr. J. C. Gilchrist was re-appointed Sec. Treasurer. Moved by Mr. Howkins seconded by Mr. Campbell, that this meeting now adjourn to meet at Edward's Hotel, on Monday, 5th of March at 6:30 p. m. Carried.

Woodville Village Council.

The Village council met on Monday, the 16th day of January, in the Town Hall, pursuant to statute. Members all present. The usual declarations of office were subscribed to and filed. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. A number of accounts were handed in and ordered to be paid. Mr. Hugh Cameron tendered his resignation as Assessor. Moved by Mr. Adams, seconded by Mr. Ferguson, that John McArthur and D. McLachlan, be appointed Auditors for 1887 accounts. Carried. Moved by Mr. Grant, seconded by Mr. Adams that H. Ray be appointed Assessor for the year 1888 at a salary of \$10.00, that A. B. McLean be re-appointed village constable and Pound-keeper at a salary of \$25 per annum and all fines and fees in connection with the pound be paid to the Treasurer and that a by-law be introduced confirming the same. Carried. By-law was then passed through its several readings and carried. Moved by Mr. Edwards, seconded by Mr. Grant that Wm. Reid, J. B. Prior and D. McLachlan be appointed as members of the Board of Health for the year 1888. Carried. Moved by Mr. Adams, seconded by Mr. Ferguson that this council do now adjourn to meet again on Monday, February 27th at the Town Hall, at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m. Carried.
