District Notes.

A proclamation has appeared calling the Ontario Legislature together on the 25th of January, and a proclamation declaring that the revised statutes of Ontario, 1887, came into force on the 31st of December, ult.

How He Won.

William Beach, Hanlan's Conqueror, Tells How He Did It.

The recent exploit of Mr. Wm. Beach, leaves no doubt that he is the handiest man in the world with the sculls. The ease with which he outrowed his opponent, the supposed invincible Ned Hanlan, shows that in form, stroke and muscular development, adapted to sculling, he has no equal.

Although an Australian by virtue of residence, Beach was born in Surrey, England, in 1851, and removed to New South Wales with his parents in 1854. He was brought up to his father's trade, and while toiling like a young Vulcan in the smithy, unconsciously developed that magnificent physique which has since brought him world-wide distinction. When about twenty-three years of age, Beach commenced rowing on the Illawarra Lakes against local competitors and from the outset kept winning until gradually handicapped out of all races.
