The Orilla "Packet" is particularly interested in a veteran of the Crimean war, who resides in Lindsay and who has been appointed caretaker of St. Andrew's church in that town. This is the second or third notice of this gentleman we have observed in its columns. It says: "Sergt.-Major Martin, of the 45th battalion, who has been appointed caretaker of St. Andrew's church, Lindsay, was through the Crimean war, having joined the 21st N. B. Fusiliers, now the 1st Scottish, when a stripling of sixteen at the breaking out of hostilities. He was at the Alma, Balaklava, Inkerman and the siege of Sebastopol. He was for some years at Malta and Gibraltar, and rose to be sergeant. He took his discharge in 1863, and served fourteen years in the Scottish volunteers."—The veterans of the Crimean war are getting very scarce now; but there is one of these curiosities nearer home than Lindsay, friend "Packet," and who can tell a good racy story too. Passing your window almost every day is one who not only bears medals and bars for all the famous events above mentioned, but also for the bloody scenes of India—Cawnpore, Delhi, Lucknow and Oude, having followed the fortunes of that stern struggle for empire, under Havelock and Sir. Colin Campbell to its close. He has also served our Queen and country in every quarter of the globe and is credited at the War Office with being a participant in no less than thirty-seven of the most brilliant and arduous battles and engagements fought during the century, as well as four sieges among the most memorable in modern history. His name is John Cave, and he is father of the editor of this journal and his residence is Orilla with a large O.
