ized to purchase the debentures of that municipality issued on behalf of School Section No. 4 amounting to \$400 and bearing interest at 8 per cent.

The suggestion of our Treasurer embodied in the Warden's Address, that in view of the fact that all the instalments of Original Debenture Debt of the County will mature between the 9th December, 1881, and the 25th March, 1884, a Special Deposit Account be opened with the bank of Montreal for all moneys now or hereafter at the credit of said debt has been duly considered. Your committee would recommend that the Warden and Treasurer be authorized to negotiate with the bank of Montreal, and in the event of their being able to make a satisfactory arrangement as to the rate of interest to be allowed, such an account be opened forthwith. Your committee would, however, recommend that if desirable securities redeemable before the last instalment of the debt becomes due should offer at favourable rates the Warden and Treasurer should be at liberty to purchase them and withdraw from the said accounts as much as may be necessary for that purpose.

With reference to the uninvested funds which may from time to time be at the credit of the Railway Debenture Debt, your committee recommend that they be deposited in the Bank of Montreal apart from the other funds of the county at such rate of interest as may be allowed, and that the Warden and Treasurer be authorized to invest these funds in corporation securities as closely as possible.

Referring to the communication from the Clerk of the County of Carleton respecting changes in the Municipality Act so far as it relates to the election of Reeves and Deputy Reeves, your committee cannot recommend any action in the matter.

Adverting to the petition of the President and Secretary of the Mechanics' Institute, lately established at Fenelon Falls, your committee recommend that the sum of \$25 be granted in aid of the funds, and that the same be granted to the Mechanics' Institute at Bracebridge, the claims of which have been brought before us by the Reeve of the latter municipality.

The exhaustive opinion of Messrs. Hudspeth and Barron, County Solicitors, relating to the redemption of lands sold for taxes, has been submitted to your committee, and we would recommend that the Treasurer be guided by their interpretation of the law on the question.

Referring to the non-payment of the instalments owing by the County of Haliburton for expenses of Administration of Justice your committee recommend that the Treasurer be instructed to urge upon the authorities of that county the necessity for early payment of the amounts now due.

Your committee observed that several municipalities are still in arrears for County Rates of 1877, and would recommend that application be made for immediate payment.

Your committee recommend that the explanations made by the Clerks of Emily and Eldon as to balance due for licenses, be accepted, and the accounts closed.

The Registrar's statement of Commission due to the county on his fees for 1878, has been examined, and we find it computed in accordance with the statute.

Your committee recommend that the salary of the Auditors for the current year be \$40 each.

The account of Messrs. Hudspeth and Barron for fees as County Solicitors has been examined and we recommend payment of \$100.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

On motion of Mr. Adam, seconded by Mr. Heaslip, By-law No. —, to authorize the Warden and Treasurer to borrow money, was received and read, and the Council went into committee thereon, Mr. Adam in the chair. The committee rose and reported the by-law without amendment, and it was read a third time and passed.

On motion of Mr. Carmichael, seconded by Mr. Ashman, By-law No. —, to appoint auditors of accounts of administration of justice, was passed in the usual form, without amendment.

Moved by Mr. Connolly, seconded by Mr. Downer, that this Council grant the sum of \$100 for the improvement of the Fenelon Road in Ops, provided the Townships of Ops and Fenelon grant \$50 each, to be expended on the road across lots 28 and 29, and that this motion be referred to the Committee on Roads and Bridges.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Leary, seconded by Mr. Diamant, that the Council grant the sum of \$200 in aid of the poor in the Town of Lindsay for the present year.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Dickson, seconded by Mr. Taylor, that this Council grant the sum of \$50 in aid of the poor in Fenelon Falls.—Carried.

On motion of Mr. Fell, seconded by Mr. Connolly, a petition to his Excellency the Governor-General in Council, asking certain amendments to the law respecting the powers of railway companies, and affecting the arrangements for traffic over each other's lines, was received and adopted. Ordered to be signed and sealed and transmitted to His Excellency.

On motion of Mr. Bailey (Emily), seconded by Mr. Stephenson, the printing of the petition in the minutes was ordered to be dispensed with.

Mr. Adam gave notice that he would introduce a By-law to amend By-laws Nos. 203 and 219.
On motion of Mr. Dickson the Council adjourned until 7.30 p. m.

The Council resumed at 8.20 p. m., the Warden in the chair.
Moved by Mr. Daniel, seconded by Mr. Bryans, that the Council grant \$100 to be expended on the boundary between Ops and Fenelon and Verulam, provided that Ops, Fenelon and Verulam, grant a like

sum to be divided as follows: Ops, \$50; Verulam, \$30; and Fenelon, \$20.—Lost.
On motion of Mr. Dickson, seconded by Mr. Bryans, the report of the Standing Committee on Education was received and read and the Council went into committee thereon, Mr. Dickson in the chair. The committee rose and reported the report without amendment.

To the Municipal Council of the County of Victoria:
GENTLEMEN,—In continuation of the report made by the Standing Committee on Roads and Bridges at the December session of expenditure on Roads and Bridges under the provisions of By-law No. 219, your committee have to report as follows:

Sec. No. 1, Mariposa South, voucher produced for \$16.50, leaving a balance of \$272.69 not accounted for.
Sec. No. 2, Mariposa North, voucher produced for \$10, and \$16.55 the balance of grant refunded to the County Treasurer.

Sec. No. 3, Lindsay, vouchers produced for \$15.40, the balance of grant.
Sec. No. 4, Omemees, voucher produced for \$10.88, balance of grant.
Sec. No. 5, Fenelon, further expenditure of \$114.20 reported, the balance of grant \$1.75 retained by the Reeve to complete unfinished work.

Sec. No. 6, Verulam, further expenditure of \$105.50 reported, and \$46.50 the balance of grant refunded to County Treasurer.
Sec. No. 7, Eldon, expenditure of \$292.15 reported, \$35.50 refunded to County Treasurer and the balance of grant \$65.35 under contract.

Sec. No. 8, Carden and Dalton, voucher produced for \$5 balance of grant.
Sec. No. 9, Draper, Ryde and Oakley, voucher produced for \$2.10, balance of grant.
Your committee have also to report that under By-law No. 190, Sec. 11, boundary Eldon and Fenelon, the Deputy Reeve of Eldon has produced a voucher for \$4.37, balance of grant as required by report of committee on Roads and Bridges at January session, 1878.

Under By-law No. 203, Section No. 1 Mariposa South, vouchers have been produced, for \$20, leaving vouchers for \$28, still to be produced, the latter amount being the balance of the grant and a revote of \$25 combined with it.

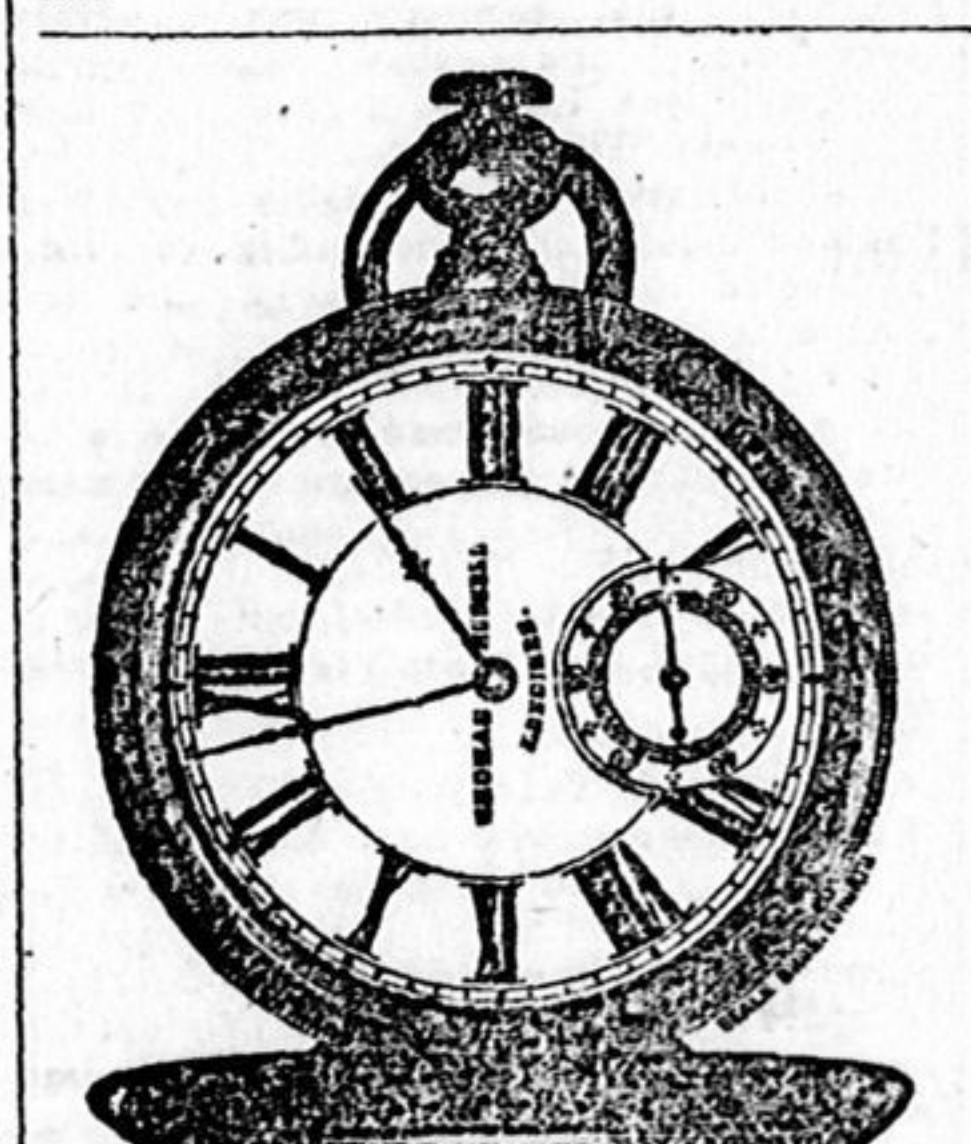
