### LINDSAY.

The County Council has been in session during the past week. They met on Tuesday, but after spending some time balloting were unable to elect a Warden. The candidates were the ex-Warden, Fairbairn, Reeve of Verulam; Stephenson, Reeve of Emily; and Deacon, Reeve of Lindsay. It was fully expected that the late Warden would have been elected for the second term, but he was unable to obtain the requisite number of votes necessary to secure election, viz.; a majority over the total vote for both the other candidates. Our ex-Mayor also aspired to the position, and it is said that he only accepted the Reeveship of the Town expecting that he would obtain the Wardenship. After balloting again for some time on Wed nesday, during which the worthy Reeve of Mariposa was a candidate, the Reeve of Omemee came to the surface as an aspirant and was elected as it seemed a compromise between the parties. He is spoken of as one who will without doubt till the office with honor to the County and also to himself. The Council adjourned on Saturday after transacting a large amount of important business.

A fancy dress ball, in aid of the poor of the Town, was held in the Town Hall, on Friday evening and was very successful both in numbers and financially. Some of costumes worn were very fine.

The ex-Deputy-Reeve of Eidon' seems to have acquired a perfect mania for law, since his defeat in the late Municipal Election. The case of the Queen vs. Waller, in which he was the prosecutor, was tried before his Honor Judge Dean, or Friday last, and resulted in the defendant being acquitted, although his Honor gave the Defendant some good advice. A. P. Devlin for the crown, J. McSweyn for private prosecution, and D. J. McIntyre for the Defendant.

The case of the Queen vs. Birmingham also came up before his Honor the same day, in which your ex Deputy's son was the private prosecutor. The evidence in this case was the same as was given before the Magistrates and already reported in your paper. His Honor dismissed the case without calling any witnesses for the defence, as the Crown admitted they had not made out a case. I suppose that the last has been heard of it, and should think that his Honor's advice should be acted on, viz. "go home and be good friends." A. P. Devlin for the crown, J. McSweyn for private prosecutor, and P. S. Martin for defendant.

Business continues very dall, and the want of snow prevents farmers coming in. The business men are all praying that Vennor may do better in his next cold "dip" and snow, which he puts down for first part of next month, than he did on his last.

The Irish Relief Movement has not as yet struck here, and as we have a large Irish population both in the Town and surrounding country it seems strange that no effort has been put forth to assist their fellow countrymen.

A great deal of dissatisfaction is felt in regard to the Victoria R. R. having opened a station in the Township of Fenelon which would not give a bonus to the Road when it was being built, and which the Co. bound themselves not to do until they got a bonus. It only shows that people should not put their faith in bonus-hunting Railway managers.




