Accident.—Mr. Rod. Campbell informs us that his cousin, Mr. Roderick McLeod, formerly of this place, met with a fatal accident, about two weeks ago. While jumping on a moving train in a town in Michigan, U. S., he fell between the cars and was cut in two, expiring in a few minutes.

Drowning Accident.—On last Friday night, a man named Lowe left Keys' hotel, Cobocouk, to go to his boarding house, and through some unaccountable means he wandered on to the ice above the sawmill, and slipped into an air-hole and was drowned. His body was found the next morning in about four feet of water. It is not known how he got on the ice, as it is claimed he was sober when he left the hotel, but as he was complaining of being sick it is supposed he became deranged, and wandered off the road, not knowing where he was going, and fell into the ice hole.

February.—The month just opening—is a remarkable month in more respects than one. It is said that no one living, their children or their children's children, will ever see such a remarkable February again. Being leap-year, it has an odd number of days. It has fivesundays. It commences on Sunday and ends on Sunday. The five Sundays correspond in date with those of the following August. Altogether a truly remarkable month. Among the Romans, the month originally had twenty nine days, but when the Senate decreed that the eighth month should be named after the Emperor Augustus, one day was taken from February and bestowed on August, giving the latter month thirty-one days, in order that it might not be inferior to July, named after Julius Cæsar.
