OUR Reform and Conservative friends have been holding meetings of their respective parties lately at Kirkfield. Both are quite confident that to them will belong the victory at the coming elections. We hope it may, but somehow we doubt it.

THE Port Hope Guide demands for the women of Ontario, or rather those women who possess real estate [the right to vote. This is bringing the question of "women's rights" nearer home. This would form an inexhaustible subject for our village Debating Society.

THE people of Lindsay are offering a strenuous opposition to the proposed amalgamation of the Midland and T. & N. R. An influential deputation lately waited on the government with a protest. Lindsay says too much has been paid for a railway competition to allow it to slip away in the proposed manner.

RUSSIA is progressing in some, if not the right directions. Lately she furnished one of the biggest railway defalcations of the age, and now she shows a single custom house defalcations of seventy million roubles—between five and six million dollars—a sum so great that one would fain think a cipher or two must have clung to the news of the defalcation while coming over the wires.

DENMARK possesses at the present moment not only the best torpedo boats, but the best scientific arrangements for launching fish torpedoes against the enemy. In case of war, though her fleet is very insignificant, she would be able by the use of fish torpedoes to virtually close the entrance to the Baltic. The Danes also possess islands in the neighborhood of the great German naval station Kiel, which are a standing menace to the German navy.

MR. JNO. DRYDEN, M. P. P., for South Ontario, has moved for a return of all sheep killed by dogs in the various municipalities in this province and the amounts paid for the same during the years 1879, 1880, and 1881, with a view to legislation on the subject. Mr. Dryden has hit the mark, and we sincerely hope his information will result in something being done to remedy this increasing nuisance.

ACCORDING to a German economist, the income of the world is \$13,520,000,000; debt, \$10,926,000,000; taxes, \$2,002,000,000; capital, \$85,612,000,000. Sweden has the smallest debt, or \$50,000,000; France the largest, or \$2,140,000,000. The United States has the largest income, and England the most capital. Italy is the heaviest taxed, paying 35 per cent. of its income for taxes to the average 15 per cent. of other nations.

THE Toronto World in a recent issue calls the attention of the people of Ontario to the fact that it is about time to call a halt in the matter of reckless railway chartering. This is a point for which we have steadily contended, the fact being too evident that many of the so-called railway schemes have been made blimps with which to gull a too-confiding public. It is time to halt. It is quite apparent that Ontario has already too many railways to do her limited home business, while not enough attention is paid to the real want—another independent road to the Atlantic seaboard.

THE St. Gothard Tunnel is now daily traversed by eight trains, four each way. Touching solidity of construction, the tunnel leaves nothing to be desired. The official inspectors express themselves perfectly satisfied with the condition of the work. Particular attention was paid to the windy stretch, which has caused so much trouble and given rise to so many fears, but the massive granite masonry with which this part of the passage is stayed seems admirably adapted to its purpose, and shows no sign of yielding to the immense pressure that weighs upon it. The ventilation is good, and no inconvenience was experienced from the temperature. The tunnel is lighted with lamps placed a kilometre apart.
