The boy Ernest Gilman, who was sent to Lindsay on the charge of having robbed Mr. Angus Ferguson of fifteen dollars, was sentenced to jail for two weeks, at the expiration of which he will be permitted to return to his friends in the States. He does not by any means appear to be criminally inclined and this was his first offence.

In another column will be found a synopsis of the Leishman scandal. Miss Leishman is well known in Woodville, and here while here no enviable reputation. Her career since her exit from this town has certainly been a remarkable one, and but for a timely flight might have resulted in a lengthened stay in the penitentiary.

Our worthy Postmaster has succeeded in securing for us an extra mail with Cannington. The bag leaves by morning train at 7:25 a.m., and returns by the evening train, at 8 o'clock p.m. This arrangement took effect on the 14th inst. This will be a great convenience to our business men, and we do not think Woodville can be beaten for its railway and mail service. We can now send a letter to Toronto, Lindsay, or any part north on the Midland or Nipissing Rivers and receive an answer the same day.

We have received copies of the Edmonton, N.W.T. Bulletin, a neatly printed little sheet, and bristling of news. We observe that Mr. Jno. A. McDougall, (formerly of Woodville,) who was east last fall, arrived home safely. The great cost of goods and provisions cannot be wondered at in view of the extreme difficulty of getting them into the country. The following extract from the Bulletin is a specimen: "Fielders, Smith and Symonds who left Edmonton late in the fall for Swift Current Creek had rather a hard time getting to their destination. On reaching the edge of the woods about 110 miles out, they found the snow deep and were obliged to make sleighs as a substitute for their carts, which they left behind. They then struck out on the plain, but had no game far when they came to a strip of burnt country about fifty miles wide where the trail did not show very plainly and they lost it; taking a too southerly course. After traveling a short time and making slow progress, as the snow was from one to two feet deep, they ran out of provisions, as they only had a fifteen days' supply to start with. They had an empty flour bag which they turned inside out and scratching off the flour which adhered to it made soup of it. They also made soup of a raw hide cart cover which they had. After going about four days on these rations they were compelled to kill a little black horse they had for food, and burn the sleighs in order to cook the meat. They were so hungry when they got their first meal that they made themselves sick. Although

they were as saving of their wood as possible, about the tenth day they ran out altogether and were obliged to pack the meat and blankets on the horses. They were then out of tea, sugar and everything else in the way of provisions except the raw, frozen horse meat, which they ate while shivering under their blankets at night. They had by this time struck the road from Buffalo Lake to the Forks, and after ten days travelling, eating nothing but frozen horse meat, they arrived at the Forks so weak that one of them was unable to put a fifty pound pack on a horse's back. They got provisions at the Forks and arrived at the track at Swift Current Creek without further mishap. Nothing discouraged by their hardship, they got flat sleighs made and at last accounts were preparing to start back with freight for J. A. McDougall & Co."




