This winter the country has been visited by strange birds. They are about the size of a robin, but slightly larger. The males are a mized color, red and gray. The females slate color. It is said they belong to northern localities, and their appearance here is ascribed to very cold weather. -Campbellford Herald. - Many of these birds were seen here during the cold spall, but have disappeared since. A peculiar characteristic of the bird is its animosity to the sparrow, and we observed one case in which a sparrow was killed.

THE following paragraph appears in the Toronto Mail :- "Mr. J. D. Barnett, for the past three years mechanical superintendent of the western division of the Grand Trunk Railway, with headquarters at Stratford, has resigned that position to accept the general mechanical superintendency of the Midland Railway system, with head-

quarters at Port Hope. Mr. Barnett's position in Stratford will be taken by Robt. Boag, of Battle Creek, Mich., late assistant mechanical superintendent of the Chicago and Grand Trunk Railway. As a lad Mr. Barnett entered the service of the G. W. R. of England under Mr. Joseph Armstrong, and worked in the shops for nearly three years. He then entered the drawing office of that company, where his abilities soon placed him in the position of chief draughtsman. Sixteen years ago Mr. Barnett came to Canada. He began his trade over again in the shops of the G. T. R. at Montreal In the short period of eight years he was appointed as assistant mechanical superintendent, and has since kept that position though with each succeeding appointment he was transferred to a more important place. Such talents as Mr. B. possesses could not but be noticed by other railway magnates, and he was offered, and accepted, the highly responsible position of general mechanical superintendent of the Midland system, a system which, when completed, will be over 1,500 miles in length. Mr. Barnett is a member of the Aungerville Society of Scotland, and the Folk-lore Society of Africa. He is also a member of the Institute of Mechanical Engineers of England, and a member and past vicepresident of the American Railway Master Mechanics' Association."

THE inconveniences of travelling in cold weather have been aggravated by the heavy fall of snow during the past two weeks. On Thursday afternoon of last week a regular blizzard set in, and blew from the north and west with almost Manitoba ferocity. The effect was that inside of three hours travel all over the lines of the Midland was stopped. The party of Toronto curlers who had that day been playing at Lindsay were on the evening train for Toronto. The train ploughed into a drift in a cutting about two miles below Cambray station and stuck fast. The Toronto men faced the situation and walked to Cambray and bribed a farmer to drive the crowd back to Lindsay for \$5.00. Before the man got half way to town he regretted that he had not exacted \$15. An engine was sent back to Lindsay to pull back the blocked train, but the "auxilliary power" never reached the scene of the blockade until twenty-four hours BRUIN could not see his shadow on the afterwards. The snow plow driven by two engines was put on to clear the line from Orillia south, and was followed by the afternoon express. Both trains were delayed at Lorneville by the Cambray blockade, and lay there from Thursday night until Friday afternoon at three o'clock. Toronto trains coming to Lindsay were all thrown out of time and laid up at Lorneville, many of the passengers being three days in geting through to Lindsay from Toronto. Friday afternoon the train that blocked the line was dug out and five engines dragged the train to the siding at Cambray Station, opening the line for traffic on Saturday morning. An attempt was made to run the trains on the Victoria branch, but atter driving an engine and coach as far as Cameron station, the attempt was abandoned. The snow plow was run through on Sunday and on Monday trains were running as usual. The narrow gauge line from Lorneville north was even more tirmly blocked than the lines running east and west by south, and it took two days of hard through the snowy obstructions.




