Cleburne. From Our Correspondent.

SACRAMENTO.—The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper will be observed here, in the Presbyterian church, on the 2nd Sunday in March. Worship will be delivered in Gaelic and English.

ABSCONDENT.—Islay's wrestling preacher has kept out after fleeing some of his creditors to the tune of \$500. It is supposed he has gone to Michigan to commit more trickery there.

EMIGRATING.—Mr. Donald McIntyre and family are preparing to leave here in the spring and go to the far North-west. If the country and climate suits them it is their intention to purchase land and commence farming, we have no doubt but that they will do well, as Mr. McIntyre is a practical farmer and understands the business.

DIED.—It is with regret that I have this week to record the death of Mr. John Gillies hotel-keeper of this place, which took place on Saturday last. Deceased had been suffering from a severe cold which settled on his lungs during the fore part of the winter, and hopes were entertained of his recovery until a few weeks ago, when alarming symptoms of that dread disease, consumption, set in with the above stated sad results. He was much respected and esteemed by all his friends and acquaintances. His remains were interred in the family burying ground at Woodville on Monday last and were followed to the grave by a large circle of sorrowing and sympathizing friends. Deceased was 34 years of age and leaves a wife and three small children to mourn his untimely end.

Cannington. Since the report of O'Leary's Mill the village fathers have been casting about to devise some scheme of fire protection and at a public meeting held last week a resolution was passed requesting the council to make enquiries as to the cost of the Waterous system of Water works, the Babcock steam fire extinguisher, the Merryweather steam fire engine, and the prices of one or two good hand engines, together with the cost of hose and three large water tanks, to be sunk in the ground at different points in the village, and to report the same at a public meeting of the ratepayers within one month. The meeting brought out the fact that since the incorporation of the village the losses by fire had amounted to \$33,000. It is thought the necessary protection can be furnished the village without increasing the rate of taxation, which at present is very low. The amount of insurance on the machinery and contents of O'Leary's mill, recently burned is 18,000, distributed as follows:—Western, \$3,000 on building, \$2,000 on fixed and moveable machinery, \$1,000 on engine and boiler; (Citizens, \$3,000) on machinery; Royal, Sovereign, British American and Miller's Mutual respectively, \$5,000, \$2,000, \$1,000, \$2,000.

Commander Cheyne lectures here on the 4th prox., in All Saints Church. Mr. Christopher Braydon's new residence is almost ready for occupancy. The Skating Carnival of Friday evening last was hardly the success expected, regarded from a point of postures there being but few present, altogether the affair was a failure.

Mr. Gillies preached an eloquent sermon in the Eldon Church last Sunday, from Isaiah 52nd chap. 3rd verse, "For thus saith the Lord, ye have sold yourselves for naught and ye shall be redeemed without money."

A public meeting of the Eldon congregation was held in the church last Monday 25th inst., for the purpose of disposing of the Glebe. M. Peter Morrison of Santringham has taken the contract for supplying the school here with firewood for the present year. Mr. McIntyre's auction sale was postponed, owing to the weather being so stormy.
