

The fisheries retaliatory bill recently passed by the Senate of the United States against Canada is not considered thorough enough by the House Committee on Foreign Affairs, and another has been prepared on the lines of the draft measure prepared by Mr. Manning. The new bill will enable the President to prevent transportation by railway as well as by vessel between Canada and the United States, and will, if thoroughly enforced, amount to an edict of complete non-intercourse. There will be some strong opposition before such a bill as the one proposed can get through both Houses of Congress. There are thousands of business men in the United States whom the enforcement of the measure would ruin, and the people of the West, who are benefitted by the competition afforded by Canadian railways and Canadian vessels, will work hard against the measure. Besides, there is a feeling on the part of a large class of Americans that these measures are merely a part of a plan of bulldozing Canada into forfeiting her rights, and that the United States Government is acting the part of a big bully who relies upon physical force. Such a rule is considered unworthy of a democratic nation, and the opinion is forcibly expressed that if Canada is wise she will adhere firmly to her rights, which if she does, she will secure, and that without war. Indeed, Canada's plucky stand is applauded in the United States, and she is spoken of with more respect.

In France where the people consume an average of 89 gallons of liquor to the inhabitant annually, the opium habit is also making great headway, as will appear from the following from the "Pall Mall Gazette": In the course of the last few years the disease which the doctors call morphomania has made formidable headway all over France. In the capital its victims almost rival alcoholism. At Bellevue a great hospital has been opened for the care and, if possible, the cure of these patients. The cure of morphomania is very rare. One is not surprised to hear that the chief sufferers are women. France is the great wine drinking country, and yet in the last 40 years her consumption of alcohol has increased 100 per cent.
