BRIDGEWATER, MARCH 24. - Samuel Lucas started from his home near Bogart village this morning to go to the shanties, and stopped at the hotel there. THE net result of the working of the Great Western Railway of Canada for the last half year was announced in London, on Friday. After crediting the reserve fund according to the revised basis, and after paying a dividend on the preference stock for the half year, and the arrears of the divid end for the previous half year, the Company carries forward a balance of about £4,000 -on the whole, a not unsatisfactory exhibit.

THE Cardwell Sentinel notices that township Councils are regularly in the habit of extending the time for collectors to return their rolls up to the middle of February, middle of March, and even longer. Now municipal bodies should know that such a practice is illegal in the highest degree. The statute distinctly states that in no case can the Council extend the time for the full collection and return of the roll beyond the first day of February.

FIRE. -About four o'clock on the morning of March 19th a small dwelling, situated a few yards from Wm. Jackson's house, at the Scotch line, six miles from Bobcaygeon, was burned down, An old lady named Mrs. Fletcher, over ninety years of age, was burned to death. Mrs. Fletcher lived alone in the house. The fire was not discovered until the house was all in flames, and too late to rescue the unfortunate woman. The cause of the fire is unknown.

INSOLVENT EXEMPTIONS. - Considerable interest was taken in the order made by His Honor the Judge of the County of Middle. sex some weeks ago, on an application by an assignee to compel the insolvent to deliver up as part of his ssets a valuable gold watch, which he carried on his person. In that case it appeared that the assets were very small in comparison with the liabilities that the time piece in question was worth about \$150 and that it had been purchased but a comparatively short time before the insolvency. Under these circumstance the Judge ordered it to be delivered up to the assignee as part of the assets, holding that it was not an article of necessary or wearing apparel within the exemptions allowed by the Act to be retained by insolvents for their personal use .- Bruce Reporter.

A Most disastrous fire occured at Minden, on Monday last, by which the entire business portion of the town, together with dwellings, was consumed. A clean sweep was made from Wismer's Hotel to Stone's 'Hotel on one side of the main street, and from Buck's Hotel to the foot of the hill on the other side, the hotels alone escaping. The fire originated ir Pearco's storehouse about four o'clock. The following is a list of the places destroyed :- W. Gainer, shop nuoccupied; B. Eastman, general store, dwelling, and storehouse ; J.
