BUSINESS LAWS IN DAILY USE.

The following compilation of business laws contains the essence of a large amount of legal verbiage :

If a note is lost or stolen, it does not release the maker; he must pay it, if the consideration for which it was given, and the amount, can be proven.

Notes bear interest only when so stated. Principals are responsible for the acts of their agents.

Each individual in a partnership is responsible for the whole amount of the debts of the firm, except in cases of special partnership.

Ignorance of the law excuses no one. An agreement without a consideration is void.

A note made on Sunday is void. Contracts made on Sunday cannot be en-

forced. A note made by a minor is void.

A contract made with a minor is void, A note obtained by fraud or from a person in a state of intoxication, cannot be collected.

It is a fraud to conceal a fraud. Signatures made with a leaf pencil are good in law.

A receipt for money is not always conolusive.

The acts of one partner bind all the rest. "Value received" should always be written in a note, but it is not necessary. No consideration is efficient in law if it be

illegal in its nature. Checks or drafts must be presented for

payment without unreasonable delay and during business hours. A note endorsed in blank is transferable,

by delivery, the same as if made payable to bearer. If the time of payment of a note is not

inserted, it is held payable on demand. If a letter containing a protest of nonpayment be put in the post office any mis-

notice. Notice of protest may be sent either to the place of business or to the residence of the party notified.

The loss of a bill or note is not sufficient excuse for not giving notice of protest. If two or more parties are jointly liable on a note or bill, due notice to, oue of them is sufficient.

An endorsement may be written on the face or back.

An endorser may prevent his own liability to be sued by writing "without recourse," or similar words.

All claims that do not rest on a judgment must be sued within six years from the time when they arise. An oral agreement must be proved by

evidence, a written one proves itself. Joint payees of a bill or note, who are not partners, must not join in an endorse

"Acceptance" applies to bills and not to notes .- Chamberlin Whitmore.

A social was held in connection with the tea on the following Wednesday. The sum of \$85 was made by the whole "splash."

CHINESE GUNBOATS.

Contrasted with the enormous ironclads of most of the old world navies are the new gunboats of China. They are practically only floating gun carriages but are heavily armed with guns that are said to be more efficient than the thirty-eight ton gun which is the boast of the British navy. The Chinese gunboats have been named after the letters of the Greek alphabet and eight have been constructed. Their magazines and machinery are under the water line, and the single thirty-five or thirty-eight ton gun they carry lies flat upon the deck. It is moved and loaded by hydraulic power, so that only five men are required to handle it. Its projectile weighs 536 pounds. The advantage of a fleet of little vessels, thus armed over the cumbersome ironclads is that they are easily managed, draw very little water and present an exceedingly small target for the enemy to fire at. The whole fleet costs no more than a single big ironclad, and is as heavily armed. In addition to the chief gun for which they are built the Chinese gunboats carry two twelve pounders and two Gatling guns. The latter ones are double enders, with a double stock screws and rudders at bow and stern.

THE SHAPE OF BELLS.

It is very likely that the shape of bells was suggested at first by the sonorous qualf. ties of certain metallic vessels in household use, which when struck gave forth peculiar sounds. By different practical tests it was found in time that the present conical form was the best adapted for the conveyance of sound to a distance. In the catalogue of one of the bell founders, it is stated that in the single department of church bells, the establishment has nearly one hundred patterns, extending from the treble tones adapted to the belfry of the wayside chapel to the deep notes that resound from the massive tower of the cathedral.

The patterns which regulate the inside and outside contour of bells are known as "sweepboards." They are made of pine, and have that part of their edge which come in contact with their mixture of clay and sand which has been dried on the mold lined with polished steel or sheet brass. These are made to revolve on their pivoted ends against the core casing, until by their scraping action they symmetrically fashion the mold coatings to their proper culvature.

COMPRESSED FOOD FOR ARMIES,

The horse biscuit which Continental armies have used with success is a portable invention which enables the trooper to carry in his haversack a week's ration for the charger, and thus on a sudden emergency makes himself independent of all other forage. In like case Kopf's consolidated prep arations, which were used with signal success in South Africa, supply a long felt and much needed want. Kopf's preparations are inexpensive, they are nutritious, and are extremely portable, In Zululand our soldiers spoke highly of them, and even in England they are not despised in the barrack room. A small tin cylinder weighing 14 oz., carriage does not effect the party giving | contains sufficient for a meal ; three of these among two men are all a soldier requires in the day. Soups of various kinds, containing compressed vegetables in greater or less quantities, are the prep rations most appreciated, but compressed tea, milk and sugar, are luxuries which campaigners will not pass by. Three minutes boiling in a soldier's canteen is all the cooking necessary for a meal. One mule can carry 2,800 tins of Kopf's soups, or rations for a whole battallion for a day, a camel can carry in like manner over rough ground more than two days' rations. Each man without much difficulty can slip a supply for two or three days into his haversack. Here, then, we have the whole secret of waging war with minimized transport and consequently at a reduced expenditure.
