The provincial troops that arely saw service beyond their own city ave been concentrated into a standing host. he German system of army organization s been introduced. Every adult Japanese liable to conscription and must serve for ree years with the regular militia. The rill masters are mainly German. The comissariat is organized on a French model. he field hospitals are in every way admirble. The navy includes ironclads and ruisers. It has arsenals for the equipment marines. Its seamen are regularly enlist-1. Its officers are drawn from a naval ollege at Yeddo. Its harbors are unequalled or size and security.

THERE is another movement in electric ghting-this time from the patentees of the awyer-Man lamp. The principle of this imp, it will be recollected, is almost idencal with the latest pattern put out by Edion. In fact Mr. Sawyer has a suit for iningement of his patent pending against the age of Menlo Park. The differences beween the two lamps are that, both lighting the incandescence of carbon, Edison has small horseshoe shaped filament of charred per, while Sawyer has a carbon pencil ven inches long by one and a quarter inches diameter. Edison exausts the glass globe ontaining the light of atmospheric air, while awyer fills his globe with nitrogen. The tter system would seem to have the advange in that the process of filling with nitroen is cheaper than that of creating a perfect acuum, and the outside pressure is reduced the case of the nitrogen globe to almost thing. Sawyer's carbons last from ninety ys to an indefinite length of time and cost ss than two cents each. The cost of filling ith nitrogen is less than two cents, and the cocess is so simple that a man can fill fifty bes in an hour. The whole cost of the np is placed at less than \$1.25 retail. nally, Mr. Sawyer estimates the cost of pplying light by his method at less than enty cents for an amount of light equal to at furnished by 1,000 feet of gas. His ht is readily controllable, and possesses illuminating power which can be graduat from a mere glimmer to that of two fivet gas burners or more if desired. A public hibition of the lamp was given in New ork on Tuesday, A company has been med to place the light on the market, and great many lights have already been man stured.

THERE is to be a new railroad built by the Union Pacific from Cheyenne to the Yellowstone National Park. The distance is 675 miles. The work will not be finished this year.
