A LOCAL TELEGRAPH LINE.

In drawing attention to the necessity of an independent, or short telegraph line to the T. & N. R. station, we express a want long felt by the merchants and people of Woodville, and we do not know of anything which would be of more practical utility or a greater convenience to the village. An immense amount of time is lost and during winter disagreeable journeys undertaken to the station by people of the village, who, were there telegraph communication in existence, would gladly avail themselves of its advantages. Some entertaining merchants of Cannington the convenience has become indispensible. The distance from Woodville village to the station is fully as great as in Cannington and it is somewhat surprising this matter has not been diseussed before. The entire cost of construction, providing permission is obtained to use the poles of the lines running through the village-which we believe will be freely accorded-will be considerably less than \$50, certainly not a large sum for so convenient an institution. We believe a stock company is to be organized immediately and we kope to see the enterprise in full blast on the opening of spring.

A TERRIBLE state of affairs exists in the conquered Republic of Peru. Latest advices represent that a state of anarchy exists and that there is no police and no government. Robberies are numerous and capital to build a short line to the a felling of general alarm prevails. station in that village and since then Business is all stopped, and 20,000 Chilians are in Lima. All farms in the neighbourhood of the city have been plundered. Pierola, who is in Tarma, three days' distance by rail from Lima, has been begged by the people to treat for peace. He refuses, unless the Chilians allow matters to revert to the position in which they were before the war. The Chilians refuse to listen to such terms, and give thirty days in which to treat. In case of failure they will take their own way of settling the difficulty and collecting indemnity. Citizens are afraid to treat on account of a wellgrounded fear of an uprising of Communists and general murder after the departure of the Chilians, the people are fleeing from all the towns, especially Lima. The Chilians promise not to destroy Lima. The Chilian minister of war has returned from Arica. It is the instruction of General Baguedro to collect the war indemnity on the way if the Peruvians fail to retreat in thirty days. The Chilians agreed to protect toreign capital. One newspaper pullished at Lima, the Ancon Chorillos Chaneay, has suspended. Communication is limited to Callao, where the Chilians coilect customs. The Chilians are taking the arms and blowing up all forts and guns they can't use, and are machinery, libraries, public statues, paintings and all things of value, including lions and elephants to Chili. Prisoners at San Lorenzo island have been liberated. The Communists say and are fleeing from the country.
