THE Sunday Mquor law is disregarded in Orillia, and the Packet says :-Some of our youths are sowing the seed of a harvest of misery to themselves and their friends."

THE township of Rama as represented by its Council have recorded the following resolution anent the proposed new County :- "In answer to the com. munication received from the Clerk of Mara requesting this Council to cooperate with the Council of Mara in protesting against the proposed new County,-this Council cannot co-operate or concur with the views entertained by the Council of Mara; as it is the united opinion of this Council, that a new County, with Orillia County Town, would be of very great and immense benefit, not only to this, but to all the other townships the new County would be composed of.

Notice is given that application will be made to Parliament for an Act Presbyterian burying ground at Bol authorizing a company to build a railway between Montreal and a point on Lake Simcor, near Beaverton, via West Winchester, Perth, and Smith's Falls, and north from Lake Simcoe to a point on Lake Nipissing near South East Bay, and south to Toronto, and west to Detroit, to be called the Dominion Air Line. This scheme has been under consideration before. We hope to see it granted if its construction is really intended. It would give a very desirable through line to the ocean, just what Ontario is now wanting.

THE persecution of the Jews in Rus. wian Poland still continues in all its barbarous atrocity. The terrible indigmities and sufferings to which these forsaken "people of God" have been subjected at the hands of their Sclavonic masters has its parallel, in modern times, only in the Bulgarian atrocities of the late Russo-Turkish strife. no other country making any professions of civilization could such heartless persecution have been tolerated, and that too, with the passive consent of the authorities. From the accounts of Jewish refugees who have fled from Kief to England it appears that the most inhuman tortures have been inflicted, and the most unblushing indignities heaped upon these poor sons of Israel. The Government Commission having charge of the Jewish question recommend the expulsion of the Jews from all villages, but that they be permitted to settle in towns having a certain population, provided they are prohibited from trading in spirits or collecting parish taxes. They will be deprived of the right of civil registration, and forbidden to communicate with foreign Jewish associations and there will also be separate schools for Jewish children.
