THE Bill to legalize marriage with a de ceased wife's sister passed its second readin in the House of Commons by a vote of 137 the Senate in the face of this overwhelming evidence of public opmion in its favor.

A VERY desirable measure is to be effected during the present session of Parliament, in the abolition of the vexatious Bill Stamp. A tax on justice in whatever form, is an intolerable burden, and we are glad to see this one removed.

WE learn that the suit brought by Mr. Ashman to unseat his opponent in the recent Municipal Elections in this Township, came to an ignominious end last week, the Judge declaring "no case," with cost to be paid by plaintiff. Truly, this should settle the matter. Mr. Ashman cannot be re-elected to the council of this Township again. Holding such vindictive sentiments as he enunciated at the nomination, can it be wondered at that the people will have none of him. However, "all's well that ends well," and certainly Mr. Ashman has no cause to complain. His own asiniae stubbornness is to be thanked for his defeat.

Ir does seem odd that Legislation has to be resorted to to teach people what they shall do with a purchase. The Act now before the Legislature to prohibit passengers from selling unused tickets to "ticket scalpers" is certainly of that nature. We are of the 'opinion that this is meddling with the private rights of individuals. A man buys a ticket from a railway corporation for which he pays the full price de-manded. The ticket and its obligation belongs to him until the company have redeemed it, and he has fully as much right to dispose of his interest in that ticket as he has of any other property.

Ir our memory serves us right, it was the Mail and other Ministerial journals who said that the trip of the Governor-General to the North. West was a purely private affair, and, consequently, His Excellency | 1ERMS, was justified in tabooing any one to the "manor-born" accompanying him. His companions were of the Ha, Ha stripe, and as a matter of course could not hear to fraternize with colonists; no, not they, by Jove, you know, nev-awh. Our readers can judge of our surprise, then, when we learnt that the above purely private trip cost \$11,-000, as per the supplementary estimates.
