THE Bill to create a Board of Railway Commissioners has been defeated. The influence of the large companies which are now spreading over the land appears to thrust aside the rights of its people and to even ignore their legislatures.

It is estimated that the United States has expended over two hundred millions of dollars during the past ten years in fighting and taking care of the Indians.

WHOLE strings of rumors are floating about in regard to Russia's intentions. It is intimated now that both the persecution of the Jews and Skobeloff's recent disturbing speech were directly instigated by the Czar as a means of drawing the attention of the people away from the consideration of internal affairs. By inciting the savage attack upon the Jews vent has been given to an amount of Tartar ferocity and greed that might otherwise have been utilized by the Nihilists. Again it is said that Skobeloff's speech was a feeler towards ascertaining how a dissolution of the existing treaty with Germany and another raid on Turkey would be received by public opinion. These may be and probably are mere surmises; but they indicate the general dread in Europe of Russian Designs. It is clear also that an attack upon Turkey would be the signal for a general European war of the most formidable proportions. If Great Britain, France, Germany and Austria would but intimate to the Czar that they were united in feeling and would be united in action on such an occasion, the fear would be at an end. But it is unfortunately difficult to secure such co-operation even among civilized powers. Yet there are special requirements which should cause the great powers to unite in preventing Russia from raising outside wars whenever her internal troubles are too great for the Czar to deal with.
